## THE HOUSING COMMITTEE

### IS STILL TALKING ABOUT THE WORKING OF THE ACT.

Mayor Newman is Anxious To Have a By-law Submitted to the Council—Ald. Rodger to go to Toronto to Investigate.

The Housing Committee of the city council met on Friday and held a long session discussing the Ontario Housing Act. Those present were: Alds. Rodger, Corbett, Litton, Patterson and Summons and Mayor Newman. Ald. Rodger stated that he intended to go to Toronto to interview the director of housing in the corporation of Toronto, in order to get fuller details of the working of the act, and said that he would like to have some questions framed up so that he could have them answered. The mayor said that he would favour recommending to the council that they take advantage of the act so that the citizens would know they were alive to their responsibilities in the matter. Ald. Simmons also held this view. He said that after studying the act he was of the opinion that it provided ample safeguards for both the purchaser of the houses and the commission appointed by the council.

The mayor pointed out that the first step necessary was the passing of a by-law, stating that the city desired to operate under the act, and said that he was strongly in favour of submitting the by-law to the council for consideration and what ever action it thought necessary. Ald. Litton said that he would like to know how many people would be willing to take advantage of the scheme, and would buy the houses built by the commission.

The mayor showed a plan of a very suitable house which could be built at a cost of \$2,400, a sum which would be under the limit of the act. The city clerk took objection to the fact that the costs of local operation had to be met by the municipality, and that no provision for reimbursement had been made.

The following questions which Ald. Rodger will put to the officials in Toronto were drafted:

Can a city issue debentures without taking advantage of the act and without going to the people, and run a housing business on its own account?

Who is to pay the salaries of the commission and how is the city to be reimbursed?

If a commission is appointed can that commission build a given number of houses without the sanction of the council?

As our council objects to appointing to the commission men who are not members of the council, can that difficulty be overcome?

After a lengthy discussion on other aspects of the situation, the committee adjourned, and will meet again on Friday next, when a definite recommendation will be sent forward to council for discussion at the next council meeting.

### CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS.

### Change of Time at 2 a.m. Sunday, March 30.

All clocks and watches used in operation of Canadian National Railways will, at 2 a.m. Sunday, March 30th, be advanced one hour to prevent serious confusion and inconvenience to the public. The attention of all concerned is directed to the following conditions, resulting from this important change of time.

If cities, towns, villages and other municipal bodies do not change their local time to correspond with the new railway time, all concerned should keep in mind that while trains continue to leave railway stations on present schedule, such schedule will be operated one hour ahead of present local time. Therefore in municipalities where local time is not changed to correspond with the new railway time, passengers must reach railway stations one hour earlier than shown in current folders and public time table posters.

Where the municipal time is changed to correspond with the new railway time, passengers will not experience any difficulty growing out of the change.

### Coal Up In U.S.

The increased wages of the miners in the United States is having its effect upon the price of coal over the border. On Tuesday the price of hard coal in Ogdensburg jumped a dollar a ton for chestnut and stove grades. The dealers there said that the advance was caused by the increased cost of production at the mines, and predicted that the price would be still higher next winter. This is a blue outlook for those who expected that the price of coal would come back to normal with the conclusion of the war. While no rise in price has taken place locally this week, it would not be surprising if the increased rates affected the Kingston market.
