BROKE JAIL AT NORTH BAY

LEO ROGERS, THE YOUNG CONVICT, HAS HAD WILD CAREER.

Alleged He Broke Into Hardware Store and Made Off With Rifles and Ammunition on Night He Escaped.

Leo Rogers, the young convict who stabbed Guard Berrigan two weeks ago in his attempt to make an escape from the penitentiary, has had a wild career.
