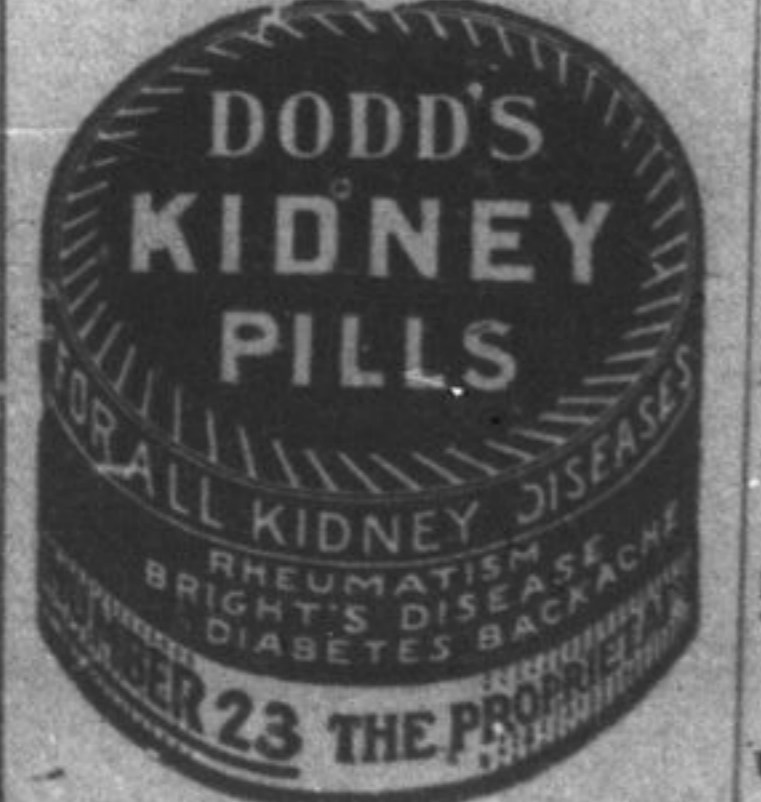

HOME FROM OVERSEAS.

Lieut.-Col. J. C. Stewart, D.S.O., Had Most Distinguished Career.

Among the men from overseas to arrive home on Monday forenoon was one who won great distinction on the field of battle, Lieut.-Col. James Crossley Stewart, D.S.O., son of Postmaster James Stewart. His work in the war stands out with special prominence. He served as a private in the P. O. W. Rifles, and graduated at the Royal Military College in 1911, at twenty years of age. He received a commission in the 8th Field Battery, Ganoquoite. He was captain of his battery when the war broke out, and with his senior officer, Major Britton, volunteered for service. He was seconded as captain to the 3rd Battery, 1st Brigade, C.F.A., C.E.F., and in that capacity trained at Valenciennes and Salisbury Plain, and passed over to France. His first big fight was at the second battle of Ypres, April, 1915. He came through without a scratch, but was wounded in a subsequent action, and came home while convalescent. On Oct. 1st, 1915, he was promoted to the rank of major, and given command of the 27th Battery. On April 14th, 1917, he was again wounded, and fell ill in May. He was later mentioned in despatches, and on July 3rd, 1919, was promoted to lieutenant-colonel, and given command of a brigade, and this at the age of twenty-six years, he was regarded as the youngest of his rank in the Canadian establishment. On the King's birthday, 1918, he was awarded the Distinguished Service Order. Lieut.-Col. Stewart was wounded on two other occasions, but "carried on."

Military News

Specimens of work done by the vocational classes at the Ontario Military Hospital, Cobourg, have been shipped for exhibition at the third annual Inter-Allied Conference to be held in May in Rome, Italy.

Lieut.-Col. H. E. Pense, in a telegram received in Kingston on Monday, states that the battalion will probably sail for Canada at the end of April or the beginning of May.

The total number of high school cadets that enlisted in the Canadian Expeditionary Force from M. D. No. 3 was 3,914, not including Ottawa, Hull and Aylmer, which are accounted for at militia headquarters, Ottawa. These lads went overseas and served in France. The total number of cadets at present enrolled at the schools is slightly over 5,000.

Lieut.-Col. W. Rhoades, D.S.O. (with bar), M.C., Croix de Guerre and Mons Star, and wearing the Queen's South African medal and the Coronation decoration, was honored by the officers of the 5th Canadian Mounted Rifles, by a dinner in his honor given at the Windsor Hotel, Montreal, on Friday evening. The occasion was a reunion of the returned officers and a send-off to Lieut.-Col. Rhoades, who is returning to take up military duties at the Royal Military College, Kingston.

According to a story that comes to Kingston from Camp Kinmel, in Wales, where the recent Canadian riot took place, it was a former Kingston baseball player who was the real ringleader and started the fireworks. The Kingston man got away from the camp and returned to Canada.

The Pembroke Observer says: "The Kingston Whig speaks of the 21st as 'Kingston's own battalion,' but we fancy Kingston has about as much claim to that unit as the city of Ottawa had to the P. P. C. L. I., the original members of which were recruited from all over Canada. Pembroke sent to the 21st upwards of fifty splendid volunteers, and from other parts of the counties of Lanark and Renfrew large numbers joined the original battalion. We don't at all envy Kingston the pleasure of welcoming the battalion home, and we hope the old city does justice to the opportunity to display the country's gratitude to one of Canada's best fighting units, but we feel that this part of Ontario is entitled to some share of the reflected glory of the battalion's achievements."

A message at noon on Monday stated that the Northland party was due here about 5 p.m.
