WHEN TREATY IS SIGNED.

Then O. J. C. Officials Will Announce Usual Spring Meeting.

The Daily Racing Form carries the following: The larger tracks of the Canadian circuit are preparing to resume racing this year. It is expected that the order-in-Council prohibiting the sport will be lifted when the treaty of peace is signed, though no agreement with the Canadian Government has been reached, as was recently reported.

Discussing the matter, Secretary W. P. Fraser, of the Ontario Jockey Club, told a representative of the Daily Racing Form, that, though no formal agreement with the Government had been had, as soon as the peace treaty is signed the Ontario Jockey Club expects to make an announcement of the usual spring meeting at Woodbine, beginning May 24th.

Messrs. Northey, of Montreal, and Louden, of Hamilton, confirmed the statement that nothing definite had been done by their associations, but agreed with the Toronto plans.

The anti-racing element has again started its campaign against racing in Ottawa, but turf interests are sanguine that racing will be resumed this summer, and agents of the Canadian clubs are doing missionary work in the east and in Kentucky, looking toward the recruiting of crews for the pari-mutuel machines, and lining up stables of the best class for entries in the races which may come when the ban is lifted.

"SHAG" SIGNS WITH MCGILL.

In Full Charge of All Athletics Next Season.

A Montreal despatch says that Frank Shaughnessy will not manage the Hamilton Baseball Club or any other athletic organization of that city this season, was assured Saturday when he signed a contract with the Athletic Association of McGill University.

Shaughnessy will be in full charge of all athletics at McGill next season, his term to commence when the university reopens in the autumn. Shaughnessy will coach the rugby players, and that will be followed by the hockey club, and later in the season he will also coach the basketball players.

"Pro" Hockey For Hamilton.

The Hamilton Herald says:—Local hockey fans are going to be educated to professional hockey next winter. The local arena directors are anxious for the "pro" article, as well as the O.H.A. board, as they realize that in order to make their new arena a paying investment they will have to have plenty of games. Charley-Querre, manager of the Toronto club of the N.H.L., in a conversation with Hamilton hockey officials recently, stated that the N.H.L. would gladly welcome Hamilton to its ranks, so it does not look as if this city will have to do any begging to become affiliated. A four-club league would prove much better than the present bottled arrangement, and Hamilton would make an ideal fourth club, the league officials say.

Another Hamilton athlete has arrived home in George ("Shooze") Ireland, who left here with the 208th Battalion, and was later transferred to the 144th, from which he was drafted to the 102nd in France. He was with the latter battalion when he was wounded in a trench raid in March of last year. George played football with the Tigers, and was also prominent in hockey before the war and looks capable of going through another gridiron battle or two.

CENTRAL ONTARIO LEAGUE.

Single Empire System and O.A.B.A. Rules Adopted.

The Central Ontario Amateur Baseball Association met at Port Hope and organized for the season. The following clubs were admitted: Lindsay, Peterboro, Oshawa, Bowmanville, Port Hope and Cobourg. Belleville applied for admittance, but the remaining teams objected on account of the extra mileage and the application was refused. Another group will be formed in the east and Belleville will be taken in.

The rules and regulations were drawn up and a successful season is anticipated. The league opens on May 24th, with the following games: Peterboro at Oshawa, Bowmanville at Cobourg, Port Hope at Lindsay. The single empire system was adopted and it was decided to play strictly amateur ball on O.A.B.A. rules and the winner to compete for the News Trophy, emblematic of the Ontario championship.

The following officers were elected: President, S. Lockington, Port Hope; First Vice-president, Mr. Kam-mell, Cobourg; Second Vice-president, Mr. Nott, Oshawa; Secretary-Treasurer, M. J. Dedman, Lindsay.

Rickard Goes It Alone.

Tex Rickard isn't letting anybody run the Dempsey-Willard bout for him. He knew in advance that many cities would want the bout, but no one else had the nerve to go into the matter originally. Willard himself was anxious to go in with Rickard on a 50-50 basis and submitted a plan to Tex whereby he would not interfere with any plans or arrangements, but would abide by anything Rickard said or did. 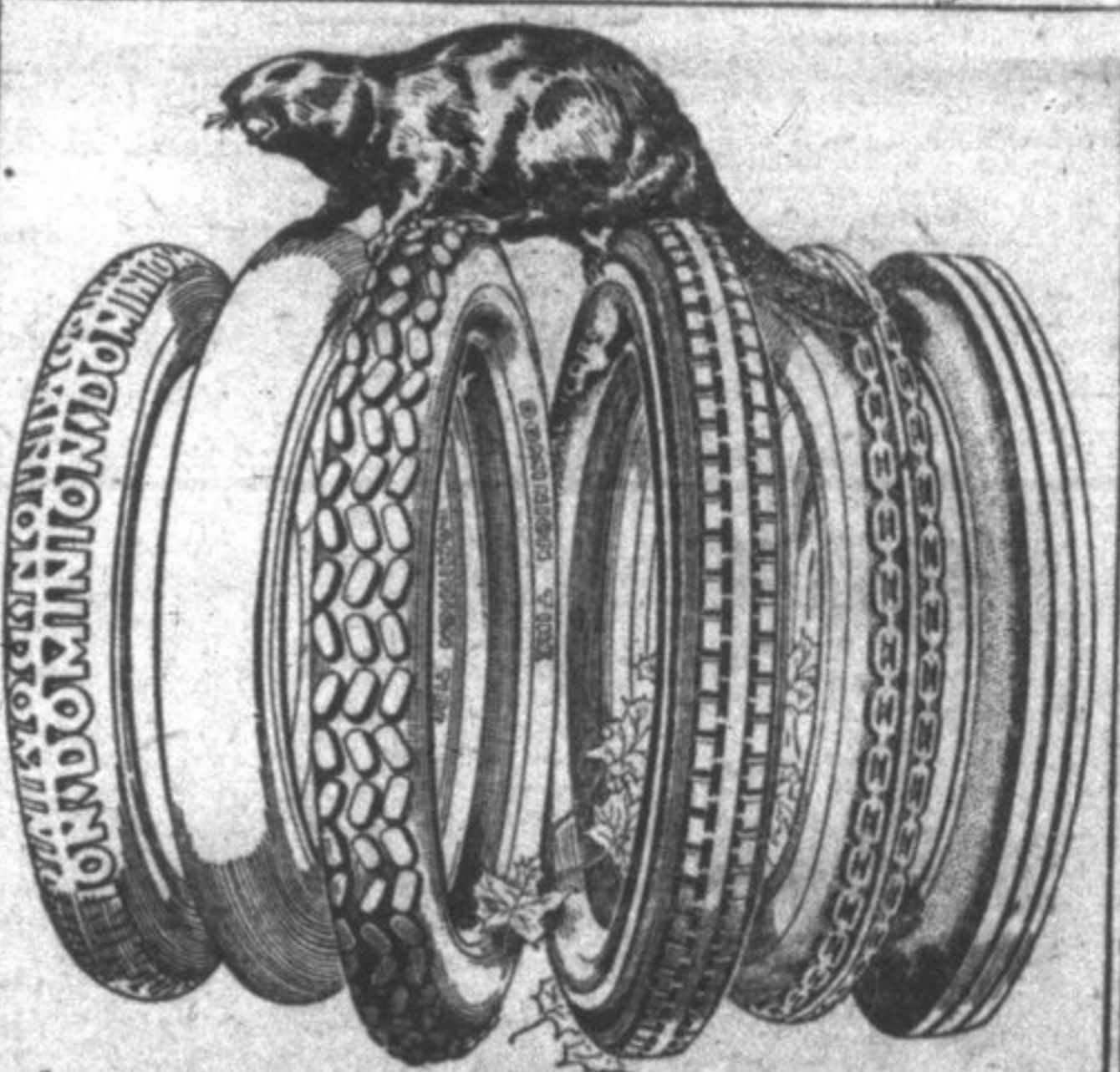
