### AMATEUR BASEBALL MAKING GREAT STRIDES

Leagues Are Springing Up All Over Province—Toronto's Big Share.

Baseball leagues are springing up all over Ontario and this season will knock all records into a cocked hat. Secretary Smith of the Ontario Amateur Baseball Association reports that it is hard to keep track of all the new leagues. Toronto has gone into the diamond game with a vengeance, and last year's mark of five senior leagues will be hoisted to eight.

Two intermediate leagues will be found doing business in the Queen City, and the juniors will provide four or five. In addition to this there will be a host of juvenile and midget leagues. The big trouble will be finding playing space for all these leagues.

It is the same all over the province. The Midland Ontario League will have six clubs and every town in this league will also have a town league. The Trolley League takes in Kitchener, Guelph, Galt and Preston. Woodstock announces a town league, and Brantford will again be in line with a league of their own.

Hamilton will have three leagues working in place of two last year. Kingston will also be in line.

### NEW ZEALAND WON.

The Mother Country Was Beaten in Rugby Final.

At Inverleith, Edinburgh, on Saturday, New Zealand defeated Mother Country by 6 to 3 in the final of the inter-service rugby football tournament, before 15,000 spectators. The game was fast and strenuous.

New Zealand's scrummers showed to good advantage throughout the play. Bellis scored for New Zealand and Stohr failed to improve. Storey rain in from mid-field and Stohr again failed to convert, leaving the score 6 to 0 for New Zealand.

Mother Country forced the play in the second period, the backs combining cleverly. Lewis broke through and scored a try for Mother Country, which was not converted, leaving the final score 6 to 3.

In an exhibition game (English style), Australia defeated Canada by 38 to 0.

### New Hockey Rinks.

A number of towns in Ontario expect to have new hockey rinks for next winter, but those interested should get busy right away and not wait until the snow returns to develop their plans. Brantford, Kitchener, Niagara Falls, Listowel, and London are talking of building new rinks and Kingston is also taking the matter over under consideration. Preston is to have an artificial ice plant in their fine big rink, and if the other towns do not get busy this town will outstrip them all for hockey accommodation in Western Ontario.

### Will Develop Athletes.

Ambitious plans at track athletics and swimming are announced at Brantford, by Director George Mosley, who is aiming to develop material for the Olympic trials in 1920.

Pete Verity, Ontario 1914 swimming champion, and Hume Ryerson, who is credited with 75 yards in 35 seconds in England, also George Verity, will be under Director Mosley, who has a lot of promising material for the sprints in addition. Weekly meets will be held throughout the summer.

### DERBY FOR LONG FLYING.

Aeronautical Convention Will Be Staged at Atlantic City.

An aerial derby which will be the first competition for a trophy offered by Ralph Pulitzer and Herbert Pulitzer, owners of the New York World and the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, will be a feature of the aeronautical convention and exhibition at Atlantic City in May, it is announced.

The Pulitzer prize is a challenge trophy to be competed for annually in an event to be designated by the Aero club of America. The trophy must be won three times before it becomes the permanent possession of any aviator.

The trophy this year will be awarded to the aviator who covers the longest non-stop flight in cross country flying over land, water or both, starting or ending at Atlantic City. The derby is open to all aviators.

### U.S. ACCEPTS CANADA'S DEF.

Leading Golfers to Compete in International Match.

The executive committee of the United States Golf Association has accepted an invitation for an international team match with Canada. W. C. Fownes, jun., of Pittsburg, has been appointed captain.

There will be ten men on a side, and if Fownes sets out to comb the country for the best available material he will master a combination of champions that would make any aggregation the world over take notice. Here are a few possible selections:

Charles Evans, jun.; Francis Gulme; Jerome Tavers; Oswald Kirkby; Robert Gardner; Bobby Jones; Max Marston; D. E. Sawyer; Jesse Gullford; Gardner W. White and John Anderson.

Twenty-two years ago the first international team match between amateurs from the U.S. and Canada was brought off, three meetings being held in all. It is, therefore, after nineteen years, that the international phase is to be revived. The American teams won all their competitions in 1898 at Toronto, winning by 20 holes; in 1899 at Morris county, leading by 93 holes, and in 1900 at Quebec by 5 holes.

The challenge was sent to the U.S.G.A. following a meeting of the Royal Canadian Golf Association, the suggestion being made that the matches be held the two days following the professional open championship at Hamilton, some time in August.

### Rowdy Irish Tactics.

There was a serious recurrence of football rowdying in the Irish Senior Cup semi-final between Belfast Celtic and Glentoran, which was recently decided at Cliftonville. During the second half, feeling was introduced by the players which communicated itself to the spectators, with the result that the crowd broke into the field and made for the players, many of whom had to run for their lives. Stones were thrown and the railings were smashed. The referee, recognizing that it would be impossible to continue the contest, abandoned the game and the officials had to be escorted by the police and stewards to the pavilion to escape the mob. The crowd continued their rowdy tactics outside the grounds and trolley cars were attacked with stones and windows smashed. Intense enthusiasm was shown in the semi-finals, 20,000 people turning out to see Linfield and Shelburne battle for supremacy without scoring a goal, while Glentoran and Belfast Celtic drew a crowd of 16,000.

### 64 FEET IN ONE MINUTE.

Feat of Mrs. C. Boyle Winning Plunge Competition.

Mrs. Charlotte Boyle, of the Women's Swimming Association, New York, won the national women's plunge for distance event of the Amateur Athletic Union at Jersey City, N.J., going 64 feet in one minute. Miss Mable Arklie, of Philadelphia, was second, with 58 feet, and Miss Anna Wright, of Philadelphia, third with 55 feet.

### Way to Boom Athletics.

Canada's championships in which athletes from all parts of the Dominion will compete in all branches of sport is one of the methods suggested by Major F. C. Smith of Toronto Central Y.M.C.A. to boom athletics in Canada. These championships would rotate from Province to Province and would probably be handled by the big national exhibitions. It looks like a good move and would bring representatives of all branches of sport together once a year.

### Inferno's Heart 17 Pounds.

Inferno, the former Seagram turf crack, was dissected at the Ontario Veterinary College on Friday and the heart and skeleton of the great racer will be preserved by the college.

Inferno's heart weighed seventeen pounds, and it will give an idea of where he got his gameness. The average horse on the farm has a heart weighing about seven pounds, while the average racer's tips the scale between 12 and 13 pounds. The great Inferno also had great muscles in his legs.

### Wholesale.

London Sportsman—A fox that was being raced by the Cotswold Hounds towards Division Hill sought refuge in a drain, and when dislodged bolted out with another. Both fell to the pack. By a remarkable coincidence, a fox which was being hunted in the vicinity some time before made for the same drain, and on being bolted came out, not with a terrified relative, but (to the surprise of the field) with four spiteful badgers, and a lively fight ensued.

### These Women Can Bowl.

Mrs. G. Buttersworth and Mrs. F. Stebb, of Chicago, won the doubles championship of the Women's National Bowling Association at Toledo, Ohio, with a team record of 1,042. Mrs. B. Husk, of Newark, bowled games of 212, 210 and 172 for a 594 total and the championship in the individuals. The five-women event was won by the Minor Butlers of Toledo on the opening night of the tournament with a team score of 2,436.

### Each Player Got \$262.75.

A suggestion made to the world series hockey contenders to complete the series in Vancouver has not found favor with the players, and Manager Muldoon of Seattle, declares that while the series may not be over it is at any rate completed as far as Seattle is concerned now, even if the Montreal skaters got over their sickness in a week or two. Splitting the money from the first three games on a fifty-fifty basis, each of the twenty players has received \$262.75.
