MILE AND HALF OF ROADS

TO BE CONSTRUCTED BY THE BOARD OF WORKS.

Street Railway Company Cannot Lay New Rails—The Corporation Laborers Given Increase in Wages.

The Board of Works intends to construct about one and a half miles of road pavement this year. At its meeting yesterday afternoon, General Manager Folger of the public utilities, asked that the board prepare for him a schedule of the streets in the order they are to be paved, so that he can keep ahead in the underground work. He pointed out that at the present time iron pipe was very high in price, and suggested that the streets that were nearly ready for paving should be taken first. Next year the prices of materials will likely be much lower. Chairman Graham stated that the first street to be paved would be Kensington avenue, and this would be followed by Montreal street, on which little underground work had to be done. A letter was read from the street railway company stating that, owing to conditions over which it had no control, it would be unable to enter into any agreement with regard to paving roads over which its line runs. This means that the lower end of Brock street and Ontario street from Brock to William cannot be paved this year at least, as the present rails must be replaced by heavier and more expensive ones.

The corporation laborers petitioned for an increase of pay from thirty-three and one-third cents an hour to forty cents. On motion of Ald. Couper their request was granted. Ald. Patterson and Norris spoke in favor of the increase and the grant was made unanimously.

It was decided to construct a macadam roadway with an asphalt top dressing on Nelson street from Princess to Johnson. The United States Asphalt Refining Company wrote with regard to the asphalt contract which it had been recently awarded, and which it had been notified by the mayor had been cancelled. It pointed out that its Canadian solicitor had informed it that the award of the tender was binding. City Solicitor Whiting advised otherwise, and the board decided to submit the company's letter to Mr. Whiting for an opinion.

The city engineer pointed out that he had been greatly handicapped in his work owing to having no clerk in his office. The board authorized him to engage a lady clerk at \$40 a month, if one could be secured at that figure. Chairman Graham will endeavor to secure the return of Howard Dick, who is overseas, as his services as assistant city engineer are very much needed this year in view of the street paving to be undertaken. The board will recommend to the city council that the Catholic Army Huts management be given permission to erect an electric sign in front of its quarters on King street. The sign is contrary to the by-law and the sanction of council is required.

In Marine Circles.

The steamer Waffle cleared for Fairhaven in load coal. The schooner Maggie L. cleared for Simcoe Island to load pressed hay. The steamer Jenks is ready to go on her regular trips. The United States having refused coasting trade privileges to Canadian shippers in American waters, the acting minister of marine (Hon. Mr. Maclean) contemplates that no further licenses be granted to American shipping for coasting trade in Canadian waters except under very exceptional circumstances. W. F. Nickle, M.P., made the enquiry which brought about the above result.

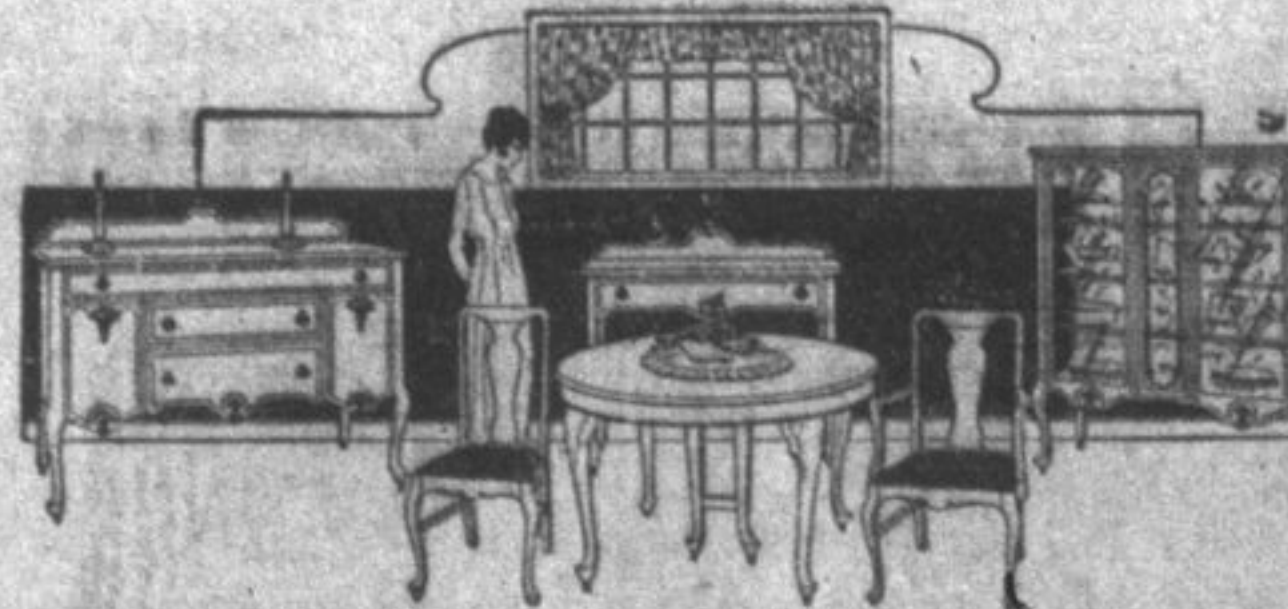
