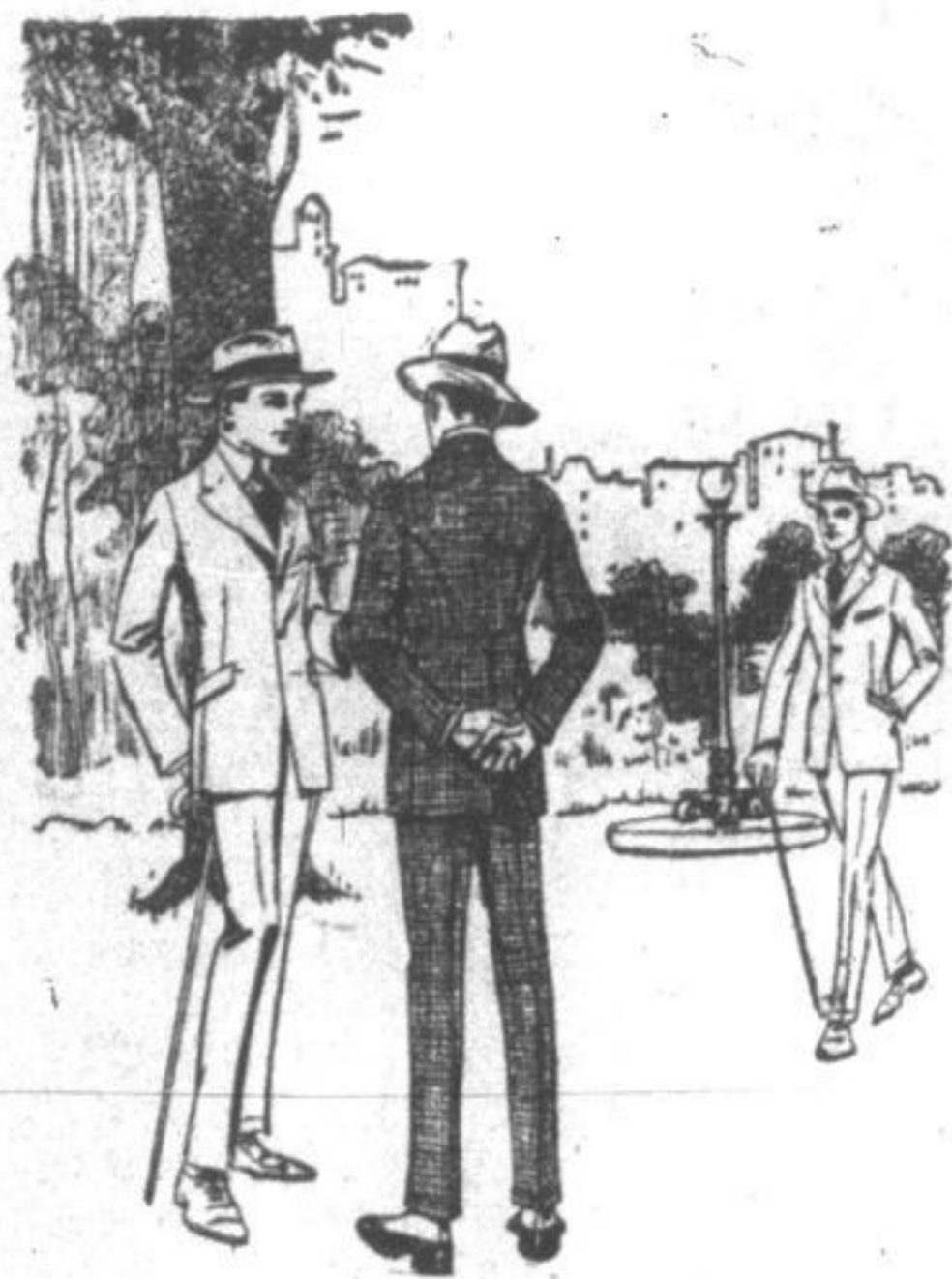

Military News

The court martial proceedings in connection with the Kinmel Camp riots will be presided over by Gen. Sir Henry Burstall.

Lieut. Hendry Connell, arrived at Vancouver on Wednesday from Vladivostok, Siberia, conducting a party of eighty invalid soldiers. He expected to leave for Kingston on Thursday evening, distributing the men on the way east.

The SS. Megantic docked at Halifax on Wednesday. The party should arrive in Kingston on Friday about five o'clock. There are nine Kingston boys, Sergt. Thomas Harris, 44 Frontenac street, Sergt. A. Pender, Sgt. M. O'Neill, Corp. S. Harris, Sapper A. Hurst, Pte. W. A. Johnston, Sapper W. J. Johnston, Pte. J. B. Simons, and Sapper C. Thompson.

Permission has been granted to discontinue wearing winter dress.

A hospital train left Vancouver on Wednesday containing members of the Siberian Expeditionary Force. One officer and six men are for Kingston, and upon arrival will be taken to Queen's Military Hospital.

Letters recently received indicate that the R.C.H.A. brigade should be coming back to Kingston in a few weeks. The brigade was stationed in Belgium, but moved to St. Quentin, and is now near Trepport. The brigade has lost its harness and horses, these having been sold or otherwise disposed of. Another order recently issued is that the married men will be sent home on the same boat as their dependents. A great reception will probably be given this famous brigade when it reaches Kingston.

DRIVING CLUB MEET.

Considered Proposal to Put Kingston in Ball League.

A well-attended meeting of the Gentlemen's Driving and Motocycle Club was held on Wednesday evening and arrangements made for the holding of races on June 3rd. The \$1,000, to be awarded as prize-money will be divided among the winners in four classes. There will be the 2.50 pace; 2.20 trot or pace, each for \$300, and a named race for \$100. The club will cooperate with the Retail Merchants' Association, G.W. V.A. and N. V., and the civic committee for the proposed home-coming celebration of three days, to be held in June.

The question of having baseball games run in connection with matinees was discussed. Two proposals were considered. One of these is to support a local team which will be started this year and the other is to support a semi-professional team in league with Brockville, Belleville, Port Hope and Trenton. Action was deferred.
