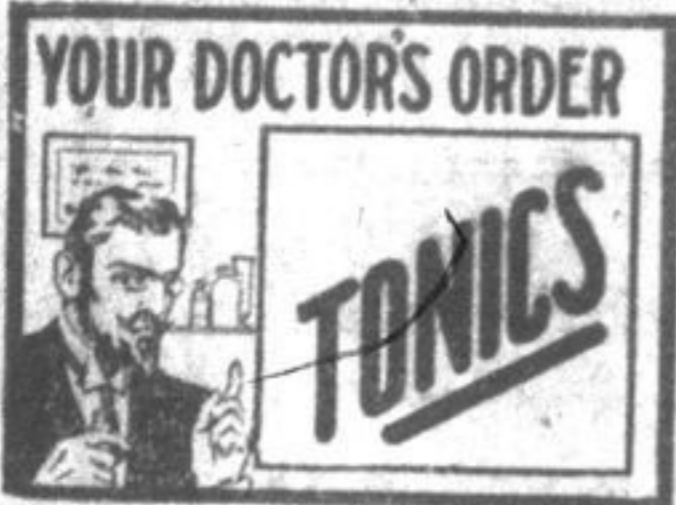

THE ABSENCE OF GOODWILL RESPONSIBLE FOR MOST OF THE TROUBLES OF TO-DAY.

Principal S. W. Dyde Discusses the Church's Relation to Industrial Problems—The Spirit of Brotherhood Needed.

The relation of the church to industrial problems was ably discussed by Principal S. W. Dyde at Thursday evening's Forward Movement gathering in Chalmers hall. Dr. Dyde emphasized the necessity of bringing the principles enumerated by Jesus to bear in all walks of life. If Christ's injunction to "love one another" was carried out, we would not have capital fighting labor and labor fighting capital, but there would be co-operation and brotherhood. The time would also be when all classes would have leisure periods to enjoy the highest pursuits of life.

Dr. Dyde recalled the declaration of Sir Edward Grey, then British foreign secretary, that there was no conference immediately prior to the war in an effort to stop that catastrophe because there was no goodwill among the peoples involved in the struggle. The lack of Christian goodwill was lamentable. It existed in the very church—for the church consisted of all people professing Christianity. Here the speaker remarked that three Presbyterian churches were holding Forward Movement services during one week, and when he enquired why this was he was informed that the people of each church would not attend the

services of the other. The lack of Christian brotherhood and goodwill was at the bottom of all troubles. The people need a change of heart.

In the discussion which followed as to what the church has to offer towards industrial problems, it was pointed out that the church's duty was more to enunciate great principles than to work out their application. Its duty was to preach goodwill and brotherhood. One view expressed was that the message of Jesus was to the individual and not to organizations. This view was combated on the ground that man is a social being and cannot exist alone.

The addresses of the week at Chalmers have been productive of a better understanding of the large problems that face the world to-day and the relation of the church to them. The last of the series is to be held this evening, when Lieut. Sanford will discuss the church's relation to the returned soldier. Next week Rev. Dr. Wilson is to hold nightly meetings of an evangelistic nature.

TO MAKE RESTAURANTS WIDE OPEN TO VIEW

The civic finance committee on Thursday evening, on recommendation of the police commissioners, decided to present a by-law to the city council next Monday evening doing away with curtains, doors and stalls in public restaurants. The police made an inspection of the local restaurants recently and reported upon the conditions that existed. The result was that the police commissioners thought it well to advise that these public places be "wide open" to view. It is known that a good deal of liquor drinking has occurred in some restaurant stalls.

Ald. Wright was appointed as Kingston representative on the deputation to the Ontario Government to ask that the automobile taxes be given to municipalities to be expended on roads.

It was announced that the Dominion Municipal Association will meet in Kingston next August.

LIUT. COL. KIDD SPOKE.

In St. Andrew's Hall On His Experiences Overseas. Lieut. Col. George E. Kidd, who returned about three weeks ago from No. 7 General Hospital (Queen's) in France, to take over work as instructor in anatomy at Queen's University, gave an interesting talk before the Young Peoples' Missionary Society of St. Andrew's church on Thursday evening, on his experiences overseas.

Col. Kidd left with No. 7 Stationary Hospital (Queen's) in May 1915 and went to Cairo, Egypt. A year later the hospital was in France and is now at Etaples waiting orders to return to Canada after many months of active service.

The colonel related a number of his personal experiences and the experiences of the hospital in its work of caring for the wounded, and gave an interesting and instructive address to the large gathering. Rev. J. W. Stephens presided at the meeting. It is interesting to note that besides Mrs. Kidd, who is still a nursing sister with the hospital, there have been four of the Kidd family serving as officers of Queen's Hospital overseas. Lieut. Col. E. Kidd, who is now president of the standing medical board at the armories, is an uncle of Col. G. E. Kidd, who gave the address on Thursday evening. He was with the hospital in Cairo and France. Lieut. Col. J. F. Kidd, who is now in Ottawa, went to France with the local hospital unit, and Capt. C. M. Kidd, who is now adjutant of the hospital, are nephews of Lieut. Col. E. Kidd.

Married at Intersville. A quiet marriage ceremony was solemnized at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Churchill, Intersville, on April 2nd, their daughter, Jeanie Mae, and Clarence Hutcheson being the contracting parties. Rev. S. Jeffrey, Carleton Place, officiated. The bride wore her traveling suit of navy blue serge with hat to match. The young couple will reside at Brewer's Mills.

Asking Change in By-laws. At the next meeting of the Motor League, suggestions will be brought forward for discussion, so that the City Council may be approached with a view to improving the present traffic by-laws of the city.
