on consultation with teachers it was found that many of these children were not doing good work. Many of the children, especially in the senior grades, were looking after their teeth fairly well.

Want a Playground.
A petition was received signed by three hundred residents of Frontenac ward, asking that a supervised playground be established in connection with Frontenac school.

City Clerk Dr. W. W. Sands wrote the board notifying the members that the city council had reduced the board's estimates by \$1,400. The sum of \$1,000 for playgrounds and for a typewriter at the Collegiate had been struck out.

The secretary, John Macdonald, acknowledged a receipt from the provincial treasurer for \$1,000 as a grant for the Model school for 1918.

The manager of the Penny Bank, Toronto, wrote submitting a report of a copy of the bank's annual report.

A letter was received from the Department of Education, submitting extracts from a report of Inspector Leake regarding manual training and household science in the schools here. His report on the whole was good.

L. P. Best appeared before the board, and asked that permission be granted to announce in the public schools the war lecture to be given in the city hall on Monday evening next by P. A. Mackenzie, war correspondent, and on motion of Trustees Mills and Godwin, the necessary permission was granted.

The Provincial Association of School Trustees asked the Board to send a delegate to the annual meeting to be held in Toronto on April 21st. Trustee J. G. Elliott, who has for many years represented the board at this gathering, will again attend the sessions of this association.

A letter was received from Mrs. Etta Newlands, in which she thanked the members for their kind resolution on the occasion of her resignation as a trustee.

Trustee Craig asked for information regarding the new school to be erected in Cataract ward. Chairman Godwin, of the property committee, reported progress, and stated that his committee would probably have a report to make at the next meeting.

Trustee Elliott has been acting as chairman of the supervised playgrounds committee since the resignation of Mrs. Etta Newlands, and on motion of Trustees Macdonald and Cooke, Trustee Elliott was appointed chairman of this committee.

On motion of Trustees Minnes and Macdonald, the commercial committee was instructed to purchase four typewriters required for the Collegiate at a cost not to exceed \$400.

Trustee W. H. Macnee, one of the most valued members of the Board, is at present quite ill in Florida, where he went some months ago, for the benefit of his health, and on motion of Trustee Mills, the Board decided to send him a message of sympathy and their best wishes for a speedy recovery. A letter of sympathy will also be forwarded to W. M. Shurtleff, teacher in the Collegiate Institute, in the recent death of a member of his family.

Reports of Officers.
In his report for March, Inspector J. Russell Stuart gave the attendance as follows:

Enrolment in public schools, 2,729; average attendance, 2,434; enrolment at Orphans' Home, 37; average attendance, 35; total enrolment, 2,764; average attendance, 2,471. This shows an increase of 15 in enrolment, and 35 in attendance over the same month last year.

Mr. Stuart also reported that in pursuance of the instructions of the Board, the sale of the thrift stamps by the teachers, has been instituted, and this method of making small savings is evidently appreciated. During the first three weeks stamps were sold to the amount of \$501.50.

The report of Principal E. O. Suter, of the Collegiate Institute, showed the attendance for March as follows:

Enrolment, 523; average attendance, 499. This is an advance over the same month of last year of 48 in the enrolment, and 49 in the average.

Miss Lovick, school nurse, also gave a report of her work for the month of March. The report showed pupils inspected, 544; instructions given, 41; consultations with parents, 24; home visits made, 25.

The report also pointed out that 25 pupils suffered from defective teeth; 7 from defective vision; 13 from nasal breathing. There were 12 cases of contagious diseases reported.

The chairman, F. R. Anglin, presided at the meeting, and the other members present were Trustees Campbell, Craig, Cohen, J. B. Cooke, Elliott, Godwin, Henderson, Macdonald, Minnes, Lemmon, Mills, Sawyer and Lockett.

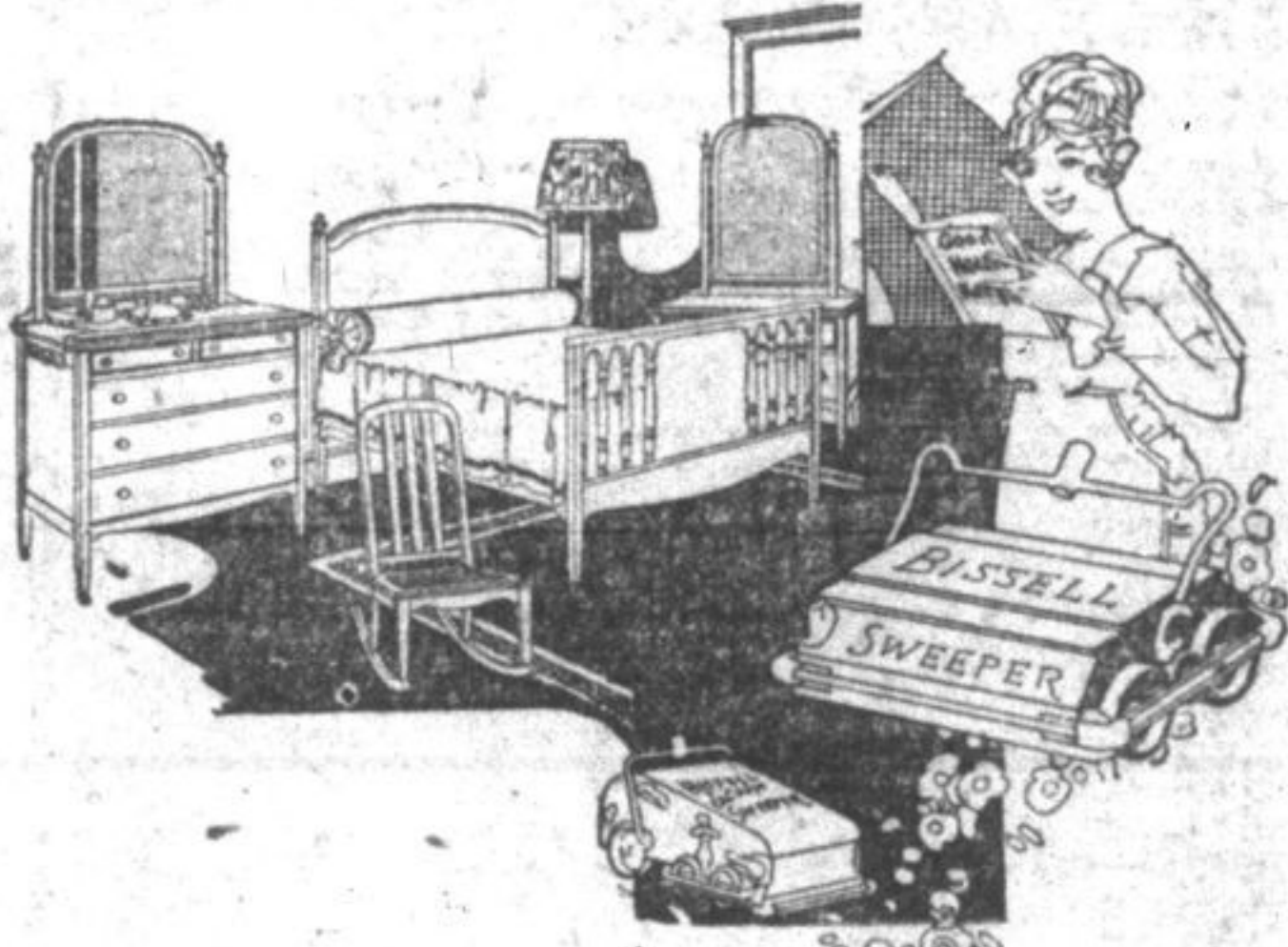
