TWO HOUSES DESTROYED

AND A THIRD WAS DAMAGED BY FIRE.

The Structures Had Just Been Erected by Cawson Brothers—Cause of the Fire is a Mystery.

A disastrous fire occurred on Friday night on Toronto street, in which two houses were completely destroyed, and a third was damaged. The fire spread through the two houses very rapidly, and it was early apparent that both of these houses were doomed. The firemen then concentrated their efforts on saving the third one, and were successful in their efforts, although it was badly scorched. Within half an hour, the two houses were reduced to a smoking heap of ashes. The houses were the property of Cawson Brothers, Concession Road. They were quite completed, as the owners had been working on them all winter. They were started last fall and were the first of a large number of houses which they intended to build on Toronto street. They had suspended operations, however, because they could not get the water supply installed to supply the houses. The total loss amounts to about four thousand dollars. The cause of the fire is a mystery, as the houses were unoccupied, and there is no other house less than a block away. The loss is well covered by insurance.

It is considered that the police staff might fairly claim a pension because of the long hours and nature of their work which unfits them for other vocations.
