THE HOUSING COMMITTEE

TO RECOMMEND TO COUNCIL TO TAKE ADVANTAGE.

Of the Ontario Housing Act—Ald. Rodger Explained Much That He Had Learned on Recent Visit to Toronto.

The housing committee of the City Council met at the City Hall Friday afternoon, and decided to recommend to the council that advantage be taken of the Ontario Housing Act. This decision was only arrived at after long discussion on the provisions of the act. Ald. Rodger reported the result of his visit to Toronto, and the replies he received to the questions put to the director of housing. The director ruled that the city could not issue debentures and go into the housing business without operating under the act. He also said that the city would have to make its own arrangements for the salaries of the commission, and that the provincial government would send experts to the city to note the progress of the work and to give expert advice as to the plans and specifications of the houses being built. The only way in which the council could control the housing commission is by inserting in the by-law to be submitted to council a definite amount which it could not exceed without coming back to the council. There is no way in which the council can alter the commission. The reason given by the director for this clause was that it would prevent any people from saying that the aldermen were working for votes. This answer caused much merriment amongst the members of the committee. The director also said that any reasonable plan for a house, which had satisfactory arrangements, would be approved.

Ald. Litton mentioned the high cost of building at the present time. He said that in the last seven years the cost had increased one hundred per cent., and that a substantial decrease might take place in the future. He was of the opinion that, owing to this, the city might lose money. The need for houses was admitted by all the members of the committee, and it was decided that they recommend to council that a resolution be passed empowering the city of Kingston to take advantage of the act, and that a by-law as required under the act be introduced at the next council meeting. The housing act, will, therefore, be one of the principal subjects up for discussion when the city council meets.

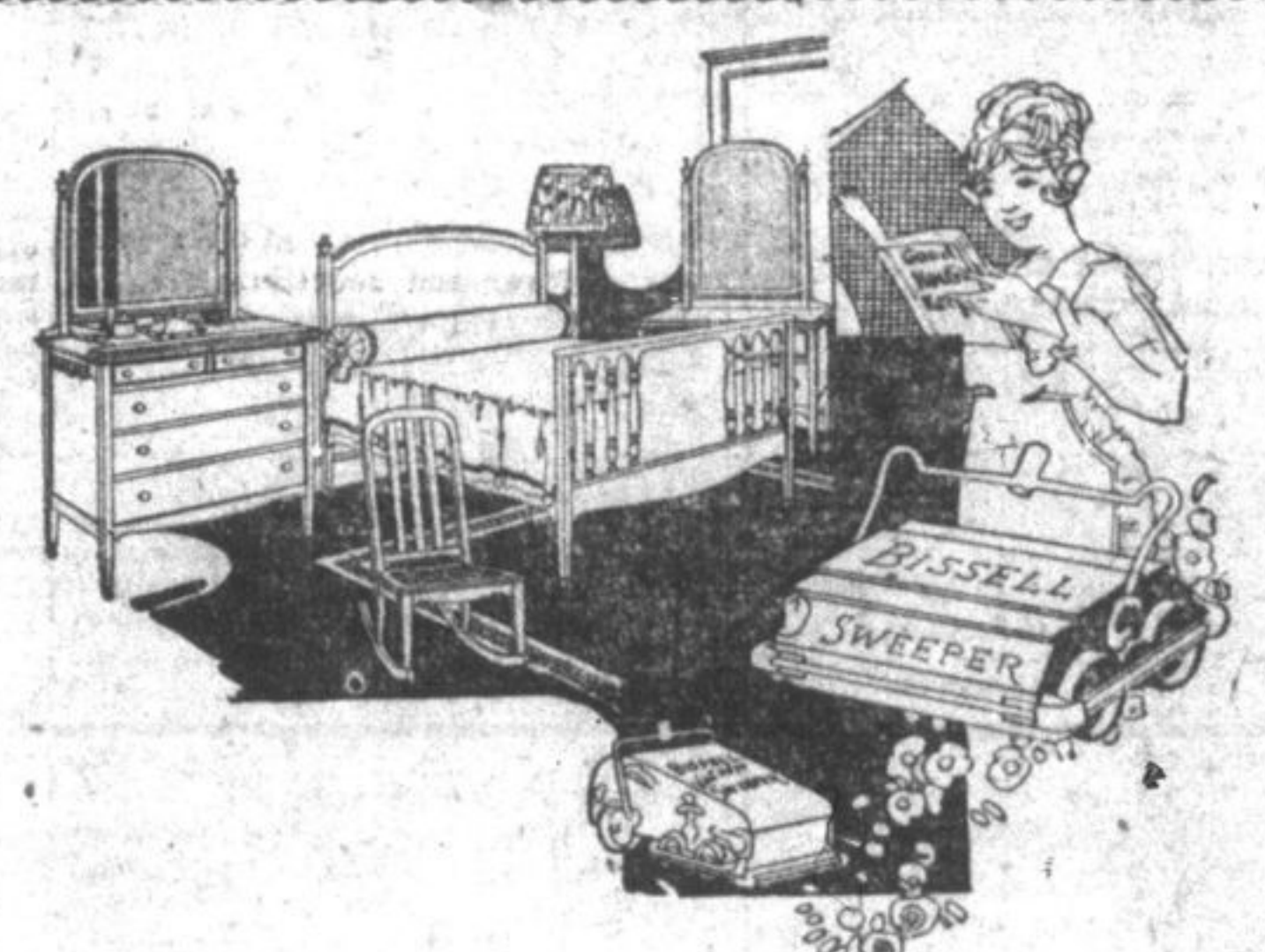
