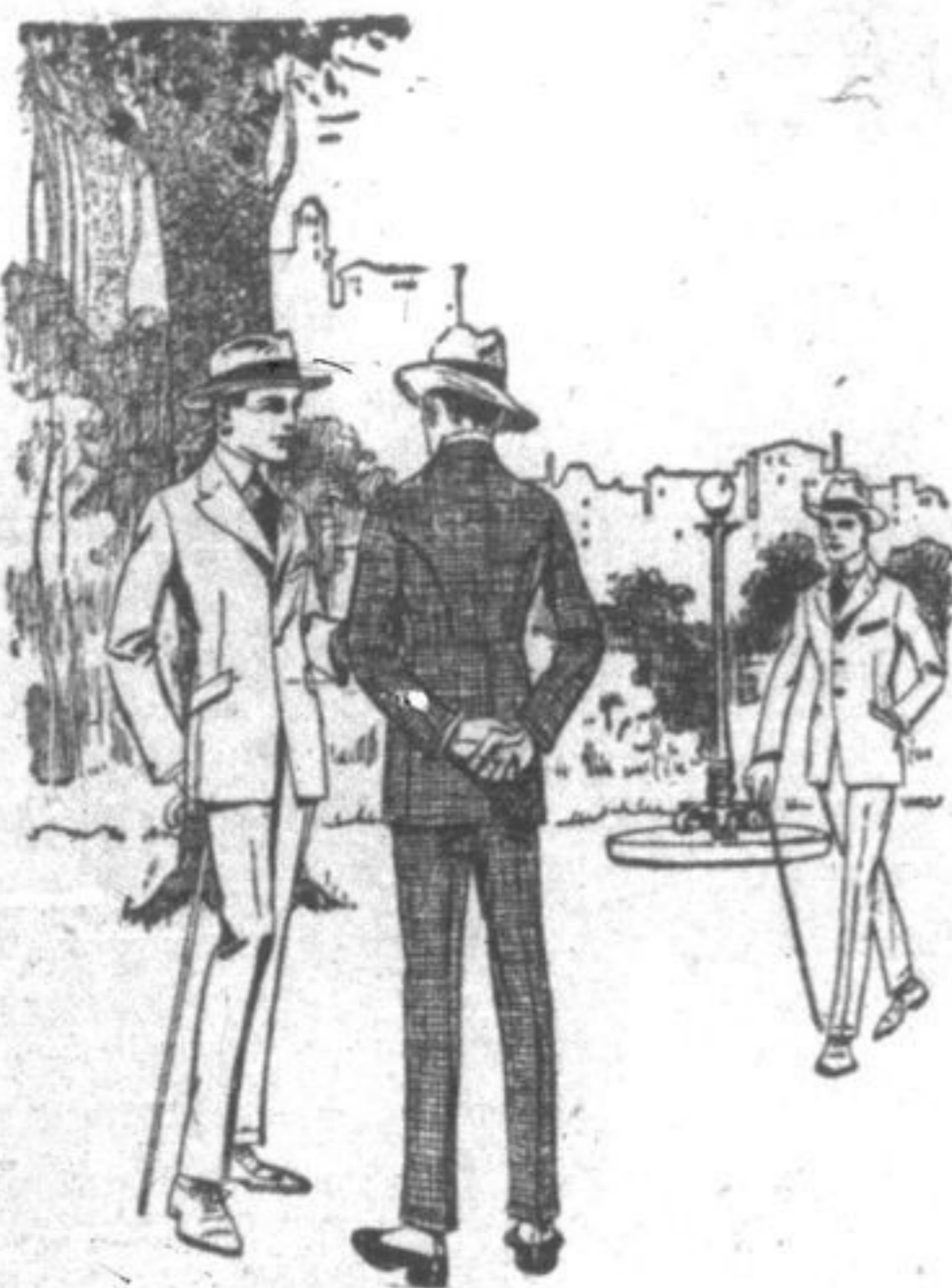

They declare that they go after all non-taxpayers opening a business here. The case to which attention was particularly directed has been in hand for the past week, and is still unsettled. At the party opening business engaged a lawyer, who informed him that he was very doubtful if he was liable for the transient trader tax of \$250. However, the city officials claim the newcomer is liable, and are following up the matter, which will be settled between the business man's lawyer and the city solicitor.

Military News

Capt. W. G. Bailey, Kingston, representative of the Invalid Soldiers' Commission, addressed the members of the Cornwall Board of Trade on Friday on the objects and aims of soldiers' civil re-establishment.

Brig-Gen. Williams was in Peterboro on Thursday night, and met the G. W. V. A. members.

Major-General Alexander McDougall, C.B., has been granted leave of absence to April 30th, 1919.

Brig-Gen. V. S. Williams returned from Peterboro Friday evening, accompanied by Major McManus, district adjutant. While in Peterboro Gen. Williams opened the automobile show in the armouries. He met the officers of the 57th Regiment, and discussed reorganization. On Thursday morning he met the dependents of soldiers, addressed the Ladies' Patriotic Society, and inspected the armouries and the 57th band. In the evening he addressed returned soldiers in the G. W. V. A. rooms. The general attended a reception to overseas officers and their friends, including officers of the 57th, members of the city council and Board of Trade. On Friday morning he visited the soldiers' graves at the cemeteries.

The employment of combatant officers as adjutants will be discontinued in all military hospitals. The position of military representative is also abolished.
