MUST STOP THE SPEEDING INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

FIVE CITIZENS WERE FINED FOR BURNING UP THE ROADS.

Another Batch Have Been Summoned Before the Magistrate—Charge of Theft Against William J. Marks Was Dismissed.

Automobile speeders are in the limelight again. The police are after them, and with the auto drivers it is a case of "watch out or the police will get you." Complaints are pouring in to the police about autos burning up the roadways, and they are endeavoring to do what they can to protect the lives of the citizens.

The crusade is now on in earnest, as five citizens were fined for exceeding the limit of fifteen miles an hour, in the Police Court Wednesday morning, and a fine of \$5 and costs or a grand total of \$1.50, was imposed in each case. Fourteen more citizens, who are alleged to have put the question of speed to one side, have been summoned to the court, and will walk the carpet during the week.

The following were fined on Wednesday morning: Joseph Abramsky, Isaac Cohen, Howard Fisher, George Guillat and George Revel.

Cohen was the only offender who appeared in person, the others having pleaded "guilty," and settled out of court.

Cohen's excuse was that his engine was cold, and he had intended to warm it up. He was on his way to the penitentiary, with meals for Jewish prisoners observing the Passover. Constables James Downey and Thomas Mullinger nipped him on Union street, as he was hitting the pace for the "pen," on his important errand.

Magistrate Farrell did not take his excuse. He said the accused, if he wanted to warm up his engine, could have let her run for a while stationary.

The charge against William John Marks, arrested two weeks ago, in connection with the theft of kodaks from F. J. Hoag's drug store, was dismissed. A witness heard at the time the case first came up declared that he had bought a kodak from Marks. The said kodak had been identified as the property of Mr. Hoag, whose store was robbed several weeks ago. Marks stoutly denied having sold the camera. He declared that he did not know anything about the theft whatever. The Magistrate remarked that he could not return a conviction, and dismissed the charge.

A case in which it was alleged that "obscene language" had been used, was to have been heard. One girl charged another girl with using the improper remarks, but through the efforts of T. J. Rigney, who acted for one side, the time of the Magistrate was spared, and the case was settled out of court.
