**"SCHOOL DISCIPLINE."**  
Subject of An Address By Prof. J. F. Macdonald.

The Parents' and Teachers' Association of the Collegiate Institute met Monday evening to discuss the question of "school discipline." Prof. J. F. Macdonald introduced the subject. He spoke in a general way of the changed attitude toward "discipline." In our grandfathers' time discipline was rigid; obedience meant, "yours not to reason why." Nowadays the teacher, not of the school only, but of the whole times is against blind obedience. Class room discipline must necessarily vary with different teachers and different pupils. The best discipline is that by which a teacher gets the best work from his pupils, that develops initiative and yet teaches self-control. It is not an end in itself, but a means to an end. Many took part in the discussion and discussed the opening address. Miss Henstridge, Mrs. Moore, Prof. W. C. Baker, Rev. J. de P. Wright, Mr. Slinger and others giving their views. One speaker made the statement that it is impossible to separate home and school discipline. In sport and in play, self-control, which is the highest form of discipline, is learned.

Training in secondary schools is a privilege that is not shared by all. Perhaps nine out of ten of our population, do not attend a collegiate institution. Therefore, pupils should realize that, because they are freed from other duties during six years of their lives, they have an imperative duty to themselves and to their parents to make the best use of their time. If this was understood, they would be most anxious to obtain the best possible from their studies, and the matter of discipline would fall into its proper place. It would be "invisible" but real.

Although the discussion was most interesting some felt that only the outer fringe of the subject had been touched. The comparatively small number present was a matter of regret. Again a cordial invitation is extended to parents and teachers, for the next meeting, Monday, May 12th.

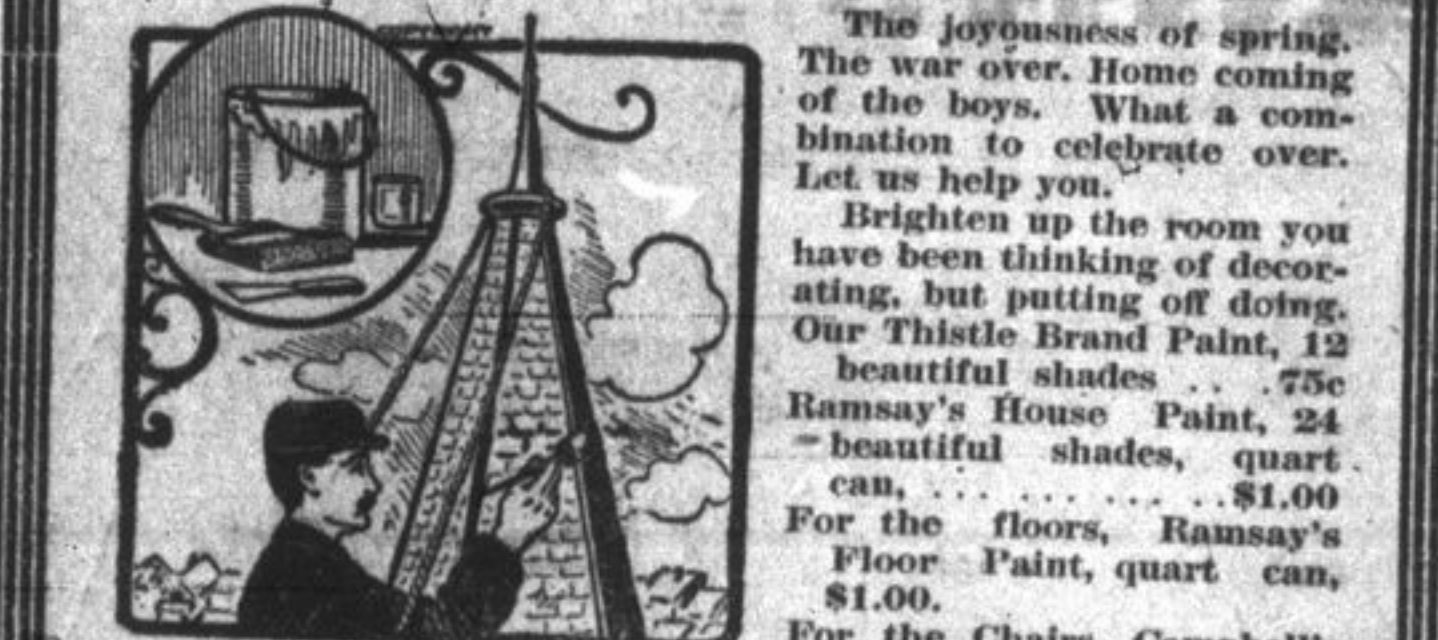

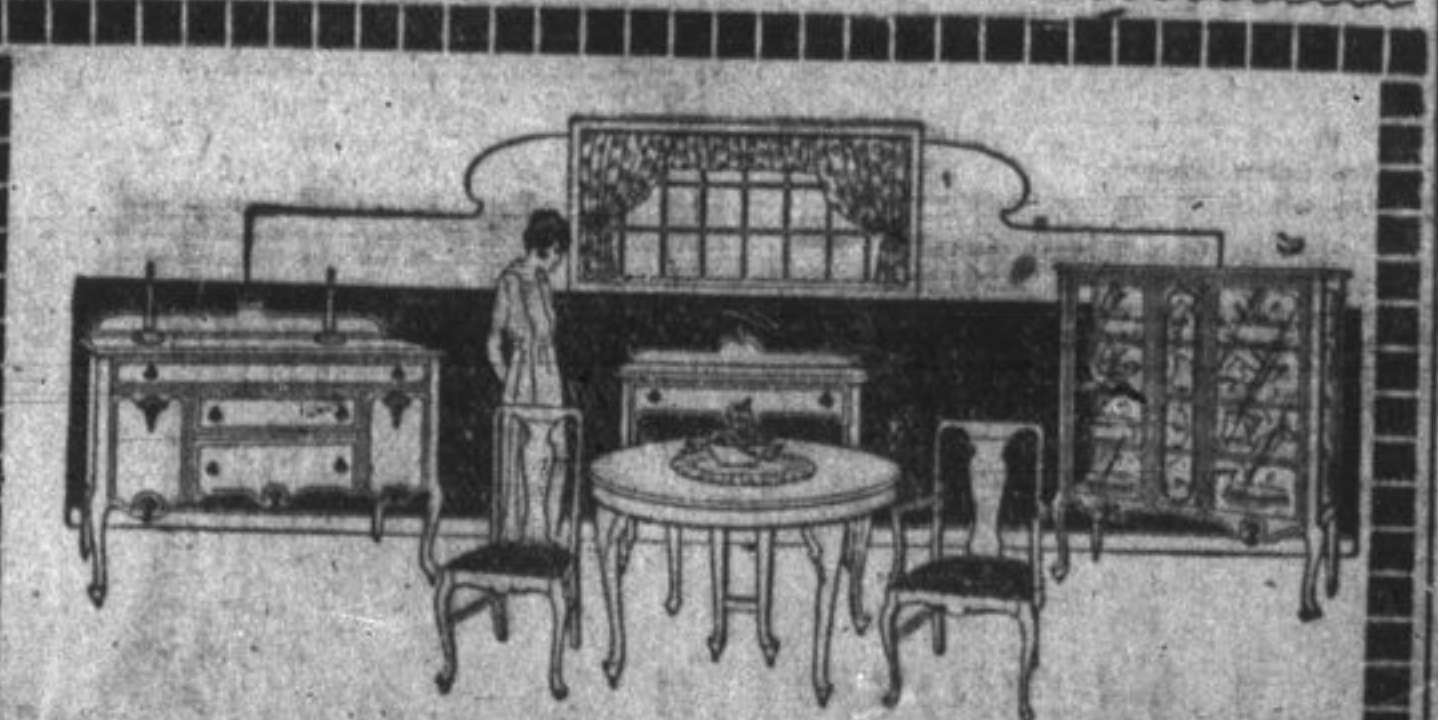
