DOCTORS OBJECTED TO THE CHANGES

Special Legislation For Reorganization of Medical Council Withdrawn.

Toronto, April 16.—The special legislation under which the Ontario Government proposed to reorganize the Medical Council somewhat along the lines suggested in the report of the Medical Commissioner, Justice Hodgins, was withdrawn in the House by Sir William Hearst last night. The Prime Minister gave no explanation for the dropping of the measure but it is understood that the action was largely due to the opposition of the Council, which made representations to the Government asking that in view of the importance of the matters dealt with the bill be allowed to stand over.

The Carmania is due at Halifax on the 18th, with a small party of returned soldiers for Kingston.

Lieut. E. B. Smythe has been promoted to the rank of captain in the 21st Battalion. Capt. Smythe went overseas in 1916, and was drafted to the 21st Battalion and served in that unit continuously.

News has been received that the Canadian cavalry brigade was expected to reach England about April 15th, and to sail for Canada early in May. These troops will come back as units. The R.C.H.A. is one of the units of this brigade, so that it will soon be on its way back to Kingston. This unit is the only really Kingston unit, for it has been stationed in this city for years. Previous to the war, practically every man in the unit was a Kingston ratepayer, so that the R.C.H.A. has a greater claim to being "Kingston's Own" than any other unit returning from overseas.

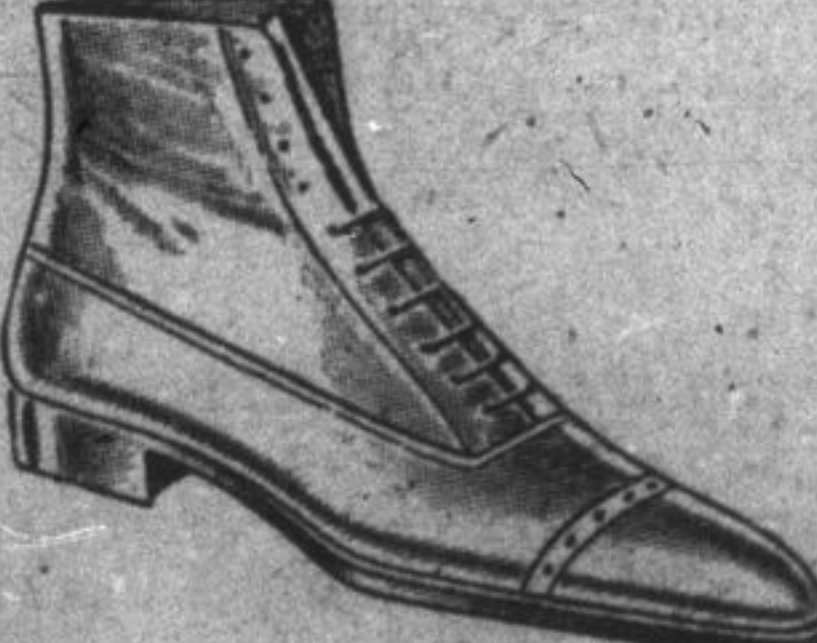
