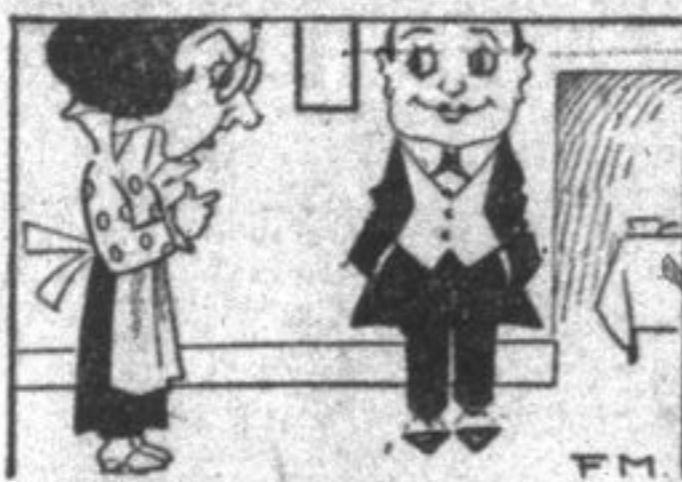

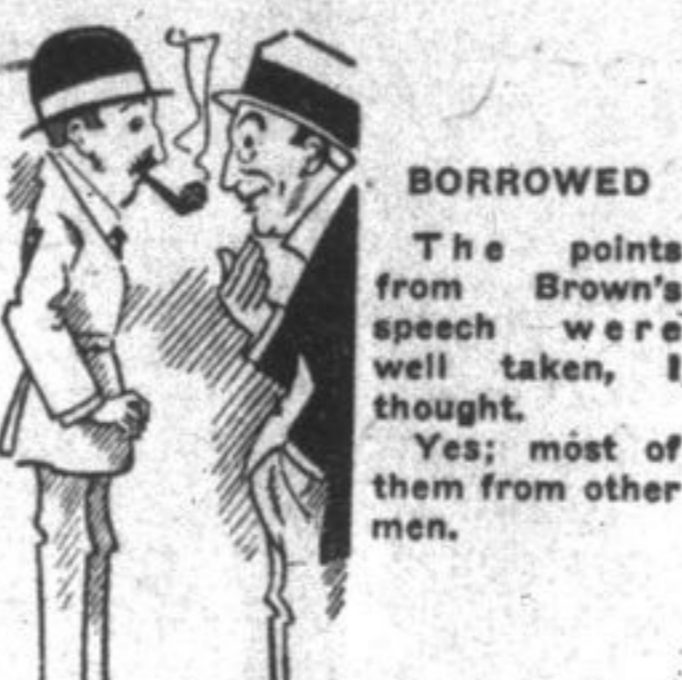

#### WATERTOWN YACHTSMEN.

Are Very Eager to Recover the George Cup.

The Watertown Standard says: With the coming of the present fine spring weather, the members of the Crescent Yacht Club are beginning to have that itchy feeling for a stout deck beneath their feet. Only a yachtsman can have and, if the present indications are any sign, the coming season will be one of the best and most active that the club has ever seen.

Much interest is being taken in the club at present by the men who have returned from service particularly those of the naval branch and already a large number of members have been added as well as a number of new boats. It is planned to interest the younger members of the club in the art of sailing and a number of them are purchasing craft in which they will be instructed by the old "salts" of the club. Boats are now at a premium and with the new tax on all new boats it is expected that the coming season will find the price much higher.

The Royal Canadian Yacht Club, one of the old time sailing clubs of the Crescent Yacht Club and the present holder of the George cup is desirous of coming to Chatham this summer for the annual regatta of the Lake Yacht Racing Association, but it is improbable that this will be done this year as the Crescent Yacht Club is unable to make arrangements in time. However, it is expected that the event will be held somewhere on the lake and if it is, the local yacht club will enter without a doubt.

"Bill" Jarvis, who sailed the George cup winner in the last race against the Crescent Yacht Club in 1914 was killed the same fall "somewhere in France." Many of the R. C. Y. C. members have been killed in the war and the club purchased about \$15,000 worth of new boats this spring by which they hope to interest young Canadians in the greatest of our door sports.

The club now enrolls about 180 members and with the end of the war and the fine automobile roads

of the club it is expected that the membership will be much increased and the activities of the club broadened.

Charles S. Lansing is the commodore and Wallace Slot and Leon B. Quick, senior and junior fleet captains, respectively.

**College Men At the Front.**  
Nat. F. Worley, sport editor of The Stars and Stripes, the U. S. army paper published in France, writes that the A. E. F. wants Willard barred from the ring.

"The American army is boxing crazy and there will be a great revival when it gets back home. The amateur ring will get a big boom," says Worley.

"If a table were to be compiled of the recognized athletes of America who served in the present war, it would probably show that the college athletes more than any other class filled promptly to the nation's call. Princeton alone lost nineteen sports heroes killed and ten wounded, and Yale's athletic toll was thirteen killed and five wounded."

**Pastor Favors Willard.**  
"Athletics by proxy" is the way the Rev. Dr. W. Gilbert Condit characterized the championship bout to be fought July 4th, in his sermon on "The Willard-Dempsey Fight" in the Squirrel Hill Methodist Protestant Church, Pittsburg, Pa.

"Willard can lose only through his failure to train," Dr. Condit said. "He decidedly has not been taking care of himself. Jack Dempsey weighs in at 190 pounds. He has been fighting the best there are, while Willard has been making a tour of the vaudeville circuits. Dempsey's greatest hope can only lie in Willard's lack of preparation."

**Creepless Shirts For Lifting.**  
Will Livie, the Green Bay Golf Club (Chicago) professional, has an attachment that stops the golf shirt from creeping. It also goes for the shirtwaist. Livie has invented a rubber strip, five inches long and an inch wide. The one side is studded with sharp rubber points placed close together. The strip is sewed to the belt, the points against the shirt. The points hold the shirt firmly in place. There is no more slipping up. The golfer needs no longer resemble a yacht running before the wind.

**Ross Horses For Canada.**  
In the event of a resumption of Canadian racing, it is Commander J. K. L. Ross' intention to bring a division of his large establishment to the Dominion in charge of Fred Stevent. The major members of the string will fulfill their United States engagements under H. G. Bedwell's direction.

#### BAR SUNDAY DOUBLE BILLS.

Games Listed for Season's End May Be Played on Sabbaths.

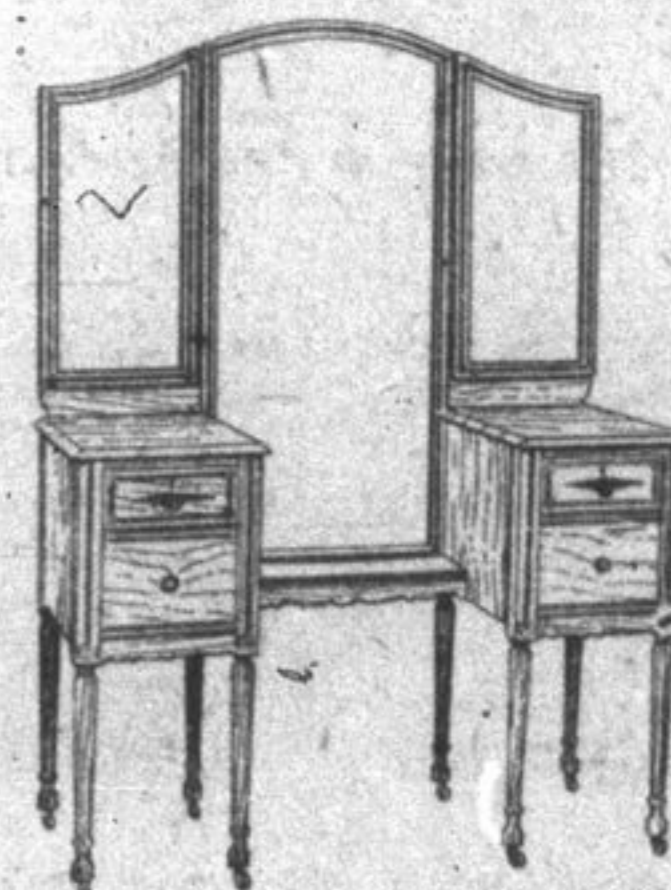
No Sunday double-headers will be played in New York if the Sunday Baseball Local Option Bill goes into effect in New York State. President John Heydler said that neither he nor President Johnson of the American League was in favor of playing more than one game on that day when the schedule is readjusted. The heads of the two leagues have taken this attitude so that there will be slight likelihood of conflict with any other Sabbath activities.

President Heyler said that no action had yet been taken about the adjustment of a schedule to include Sunday games, and the matter will not even be considered until the bill becomes a law. While it has been suggested that the Sunday dates be arranged by moving the Monday dates forward, President Heydler is of the opinion that it would perhaps be better to shift the dates near the end of the season forward to the open Sundays. He believes that the weather during midsummer is far more reliable than in late September or early October.

If the major leagues had adopted a 154-game schedule instead of the 140-game plan, yesterday would have been the opening day, and several postponements would have been necessary.
