HEADS KEPT BOBBING UP INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

MAGISTRATE HAD LONG STRING OF CHARGES AGAINST BOYS.

Those Pleading Guilty to Thefts of Autos Will Be Given Trial By Judge and Jury.

Magistrate Farrell's desk was filled to overflowing with documents on Friday morning. There were charges and still more charges—in fact there appeared to be no end of them. They came about as a result of the round-up of six youths, on a charge of theft. The charges came so thick and fast, that Magistrate Farrell and Crown Attorney J. L. Whiting had to call "time" once or twice during the session, to get their bearings. The charges the boys had to answer included robbing one store at Gananoque, where jewelry, boots and shoes were taken, and another where candies and cigarettes were purchased, also the theft of a couple of automobiles and an auto tire.

The six boys were arraigned and for three quarters of an hour, heard every minute or so while the charges were read. T. J. Rigney appeared for some of the boys, and A. B. Cunningham was also present to look after the interests of another youngster caught in the police net.

There were a variety of pleas put to the magistrate, and it would have taken a Philadelphia lawyer to keep track of the "doings." Some of the boys, who should still be tied to their mother's apron strings, pleaded guilty to stealing the automobiles and will have a trial by judge and jury, although one youngster who evidently had not been posted on the proceedings piped out, "It is tried by you, your Worship."

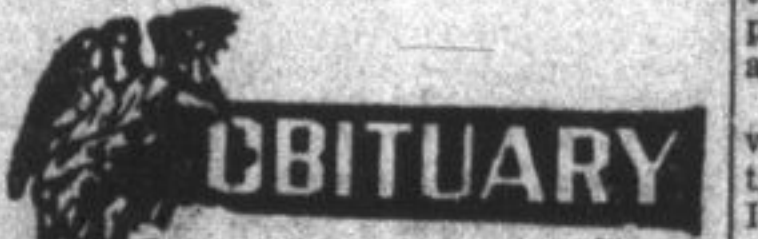
As to the Gananoque robberies, there were also pleas of "guilt" and "not guilty." A small deputation of Gananoque folk interested in the case were present and helped to make an overflowing congregation.

The thefts at Gananoque consisted of jewelry, clothing, boots, candy and cigarettes.

"Guilty of taking jewelry but not the clothing," said several of the lads in chorus.

"I got some jewelry and one pair of boots," said another.

Those who pleaded guilty to charges will come up for sentence in a week's time.
