TO REVISE THE PRIZE LISTS FOR NEXT FALL

Pure Canadian Type of Fowl to be Exhibited—Manager Toffield Gives Prizes For Live Stock and Cheese.

A meeting of the Kingston Industrial Fair Association directors was held on Thursday afternoon for the purpose of revising the prize lists. R. J. Bushell, the secretary, announced that Mr. Toffield, the manager of the Merchants' Bank, Kingston, had offered a prize of twenty-five dollars to provide a sterling silver cup to be awarded to the highest prize winner in the live stock competition, including horses, cattle, sheep and hogs. Mr. Toffield has also given a prize for best exhibit of cheese. The directors were very pleased and voted that Mr. Toffield's wishes should be carried out as it was clearly his intention to encourage farmers to bring their stock to the fair and the man who made the largest exhibit was doing the most in the live stock interest.

The secretary also announced that a pure Canadian type of fowl evolved by the patient industry of Rev. F. Wilfrid of the Monastery of Oka, La-Trappe, Que., would be exhibited this year. The new fowl is called "chantecler" and was obtained by many crossings and re-crossings of the white leghorns and the white wyandottes. The Kingston fair will be the only one at which this pure Canadian fowl will be seen. It possesses the laying qualities of the best strains and is a beautiful table fowl. The question of having a yard inspection made was also considered, but was also left over pending the appointment of a sanitary inspector. The board is looking for good results as a result of the "clean-up" week to be observed next week. At a recent meeting the board received a complaint about the ventilation of one of the work rooms at the cotton mill, but Dr. Williamson made an inspection and his report was satisfactory.

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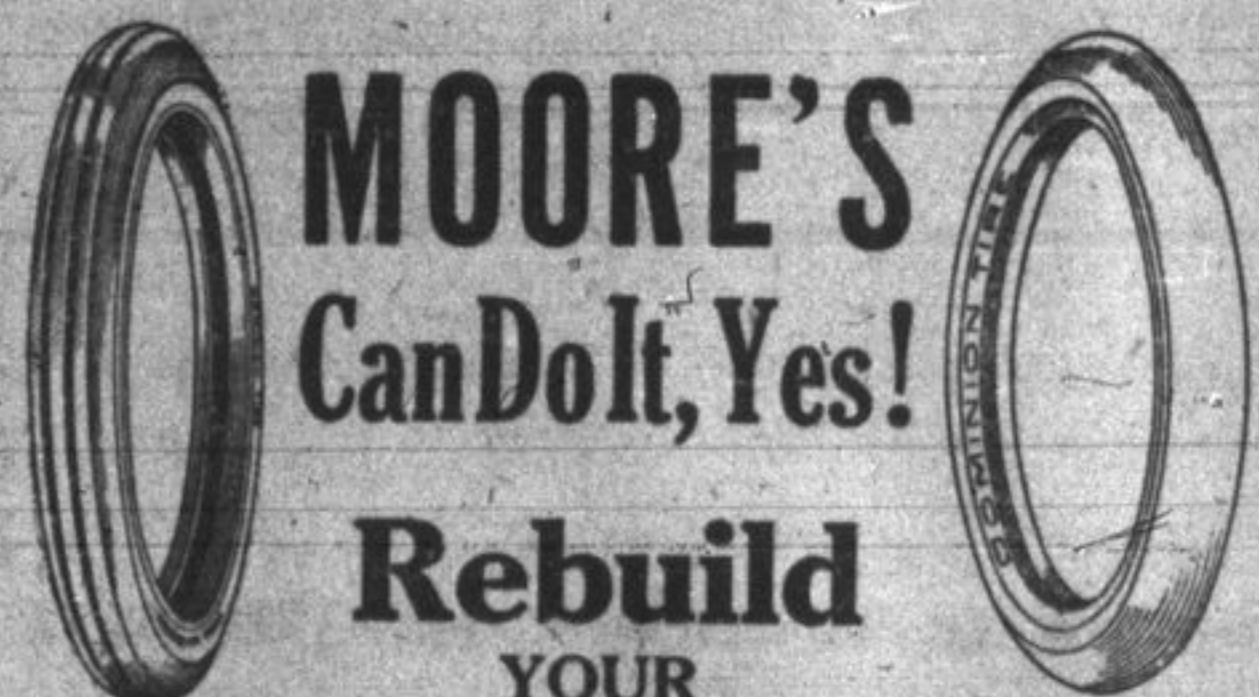
