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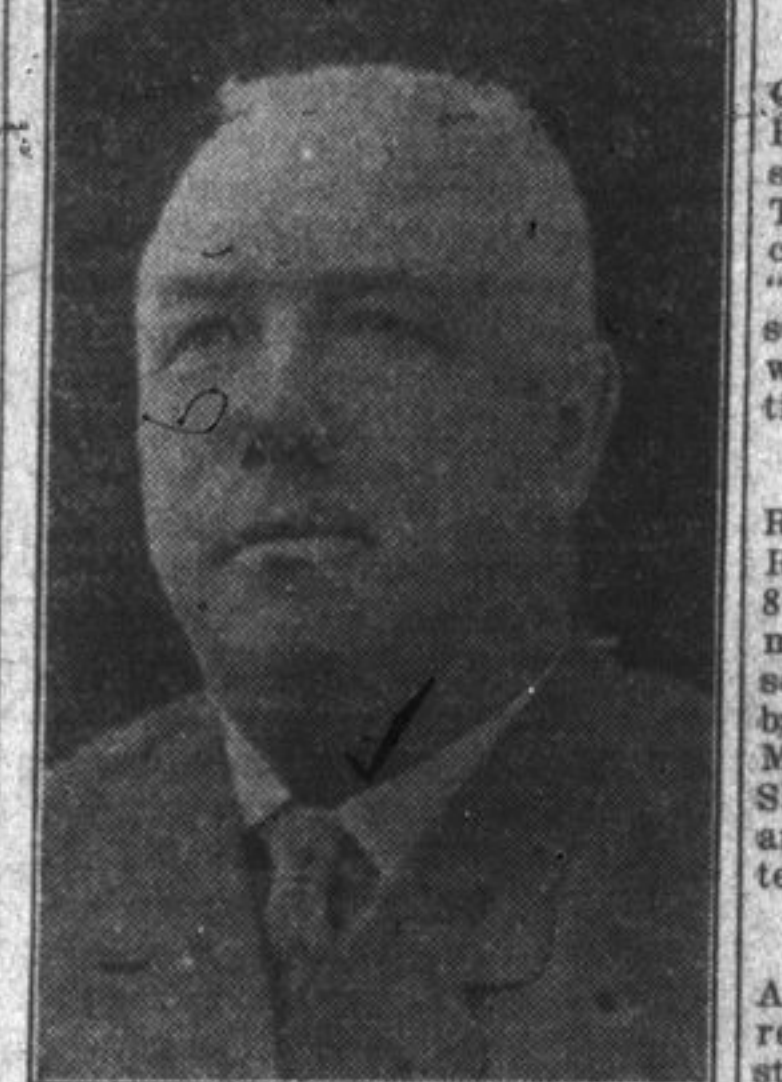
DEATH OF JOHN J. BEHAN

GRAND SECRETARY OF THE C.M.B.A. SIXTEEN YEARS.

Deceased Was For Years President of the Y.I.C.B.A.—Served Fourteen Years as an Alderman.

On Saturday morning about four o'clock John Joseph Behan, grand secretary of the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association, and one who in years gone by had been a most prominent worker in fraternal, political and municipal life in Kingston, died in the Hotel Dieu after an illness of a few days. Death was from a paralytic stroke, which came on Friday, followed by two others on Sunday and Monday. Following the first attack, Mr. Behan was removed to the Hotel Dieu, where he sank gradually until he passed away.

The deceased was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Behan, of Dublin, Ireland, his father being a soldier in the British army. He was born in Wales on October 12th, 1857, and was brought to Canada when only two years old, the fam-

ly first settling at Quebec and then coming to Kingston.

The deceased received his education in the local separate schools and then engaged in the grocery business, leaving that to become inspector of weights and measures in 1897. He held that position for six years. In July, 1903 he was appointed grand secretary of the C. M. B. A., which position he held until his death. In the association he was recognized as an able official, and in both organizing ability and his wide range of friendship he did much to bring the C.M.B.A. to his present prominence. It was as secretary of the C.M.B.A. that he was best known, but he held a multitude of other official positions in Catholic fraternal, in political and in municipal life.

He always took a keen interest in the work of the Young Irishman's Catholic Beneficial Association, and had been president almost continually since 1883. He was also at various times its vice-president, recording secretary and treasurer. During his career as an official of the Y.I.C.B.A. he represented that association as its delegates at various points in the United States and Canada.

The Knights of Columbus in Kingston owes a special tribute to the deceased, as he was largely through his efforts that the Kingston branch was started. He has held various positions in the Knights of Columbus as well as many others with various organizations, among them being the presidency of the Catholic Literary Society of Kingston; grand vice-president of the I.C.B.U. of the United States and Canada (which position he held several times in succession); various official positions with branch No. 3 (Kingston), C.M.B.A., and grand deputy for the district between Toronto and the Quebec border, and also grand trustee; county president of the Ancient Order of Hibernians; treasurer of the St. Patrick's Society; president of the Kingston branch of the Irish National League.

As a citizen he took a great interest in municipal matters and represented Ontario ward in the city council for fourteen years. He was chairman of various committees, including the water works committee. In 1897 he was defeated for the mayoralty by J. S. Skinner.

Political matters attracted his attention, and for three years he was vice-president of the Kingston Reform Association.

Personally, the late Mr. Behan was a man of wide popularity and ever ready to help in every way his fellow men. He was a clever and eloquent public speaker.

He was married to Miss Katie V. Branigan, who predeceased him eleven years ago. Since her death he had been living at 74 Sydenham street with his sister, Mrs. Mary Jane Behan, who is his only relative in this country.

The funeral is to take place from his late residence, 78 Sydenham street, on Monday morning, and will be of a private nature. The remains will be taken to St. Mary's Cathedral, where a requiem mass will be sung at nine o'clock.
