Sergt. Johnson, Trooper Cecil Gervin and Trooper J. E. Welch.

The troopship Corsican brought Major E. H. Birkett, M.C., with bar, and Nursing Sister W. Chapman, of Kingston, to St. John, N.B. These two officers are now on their way to the city. Major Birkett went overseas with the First Field Company, Canadian Engineers, in August, 1914. He was promoted to the rank of major for his work on the field.
