**PUTTING OUT TREES**  
 As Shade For Chicks on the Poultry Farm.  
 Calabogie, April 23.—At the O'Brien Poultry Farms at Barryvale preparations are being made for putting out 400 additional apple trees this spring, which will make a total of over 800 on the place. These trees are being planted primarily for shade for the growing chickens, but like everything else in connection with this poultry farm even the shade is being made to pay to profit. Eventually this shade will be one of the most profitable trees on the place, as the maturing trees are growing to the fruiting stage and while they are reaching their full growth the spaces between are being utilized for the growing of more quickly maturing and shorter lived trees.  
 The big incubator at O'Brien's Poultry Farms has produced over 12,000 chicks already this season, and is still being run at full capacity. It will be used to hatch eggs throughout the month of May, when it will be given a rest until near August, when it is likely that it will be used to hatch a batch of broilers for the big hotels and the railway dining-car service.  
 A large contingent of Canadian artillerymen arrived at Southampton on Saturday from the continent; also various units from the Balkans. Many of the latter have been three years on service without leave.
