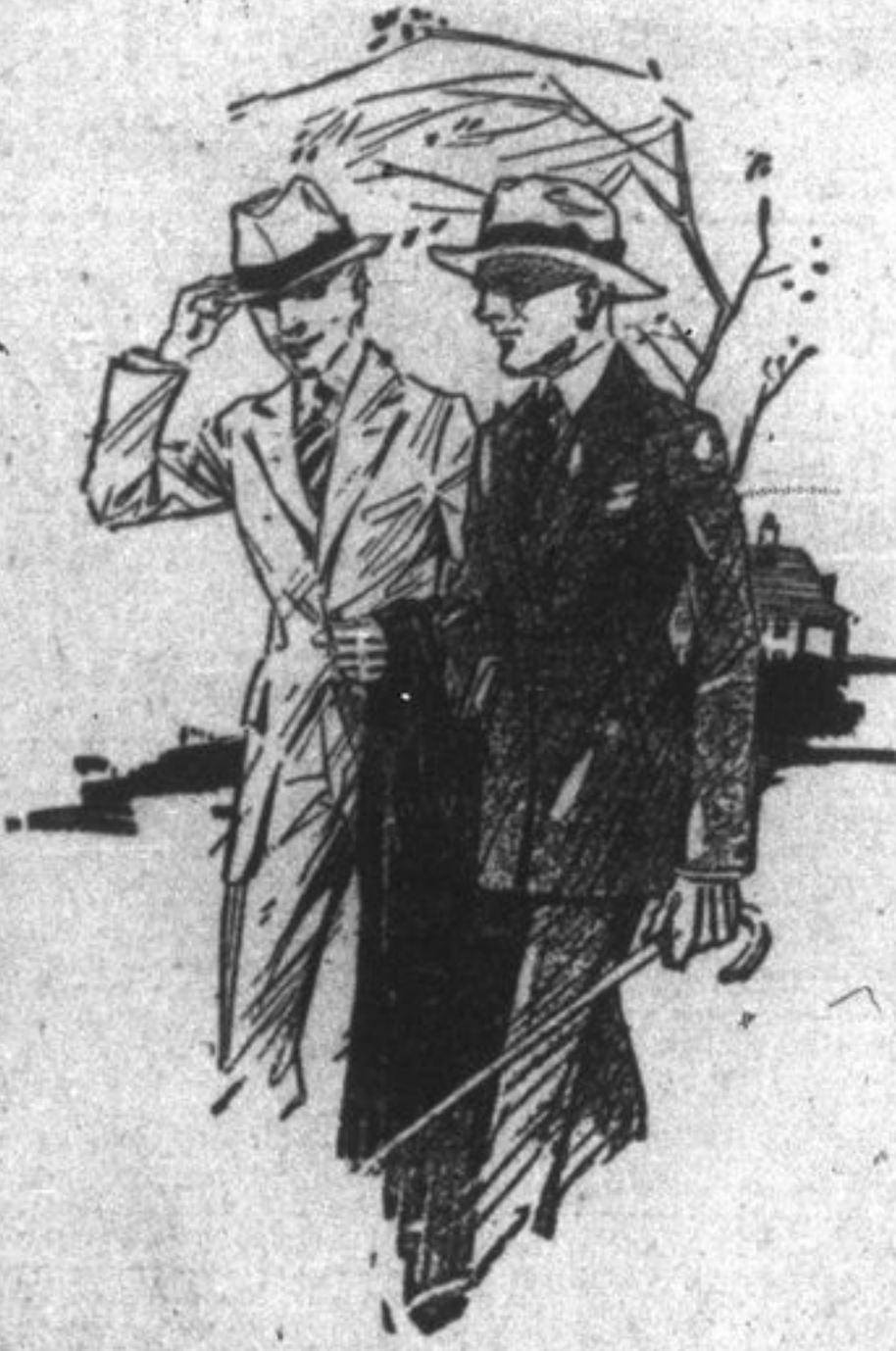

Military News

Captain John Ernest Genet, M.C., has been appointed accounting officer M.D. No. 3.

Members of the Canadian Ordnance Corps, engaged in storing military equipment in the Brockville armories during the winter months, have returned to Kingston. Two teams of horses and wagons were bought up by the departing soldiers.

Brig-Gen. V. A. S. Williams, G.O.C. M.D. No. 3, has been appointed president of a general court martial which is to sit at St. John, N.B., on Thursday. Six officers are to be tried. They are Lt. Col. J. L. McAvity, N.B.R., officer commanding the 1st depot battalion; Major F. H. Rowe, R.O.C.F., 74th Reg't.; Captains G. E. Logan, N.B.R., A.I.C.E.F., No. 7, and R. Ingleton, R.O., C.E.F., 62nd Reg't.; Lieut. John H. Belyea, N.B.R., 1st depot battalion; Lieut. Stockwell Simms, C.A.P.C. No. 7 detachment; No. 68819 C.S.M. John W. Rawlings, No. 7 district depot; Lieut. Col. F. D. Boggs, A.I.A.G., M.D. No. 3, has been appointed judge advocate and Lieut. Col. N. M. Young, 2nd detachment C.G.R., prosecutor.

Advice was received Monday afternoon that the S.S. Mauretania would arrive at Halifax on May 8th with 4 officers and 156 men of other ranks for Kingston. The men belong to the heavy batteries.
