Indeed, his subjects and characters have been compared to those of Dickens, though his treatment is far more grim. Out of his experience with criminals while at Omsk also came his "Crimand Punishment," in which, wit semi-prophetic vision, he pictured a future Russian people freed from bonds of force but united by ties of mutual trust and kindness.

In the principal square of Omsk stands the Church of St. Nicholas, in which hangs a banner reputed to have been that of Yermak, a Cossack bandit of the Volga, who turned over the vast domain of Siberia to Ivan the Terrible in order to procure

Thus that tyrannical and talented tensive territory which had been wrested from the Mongolians by Russigns who had fled from the mad vagaries of Ivan. This same Ivan, it will be recalled, threw his regents to the dogs, dared to proclaim himself Czar, though his father had not then summoned the first Russian National Assembly, killed his son in a fit of anger, and took the hood of the strictest monastic order just before the end of a dissolute personal and brilliant political life.

Founded only about 200 years ago, Omsk now is a city approximately the size of Hamilton, Ont. It is neither well built nor industrially important, Its nearest neighbor along the Irtuisk is Tara, an older city, where Peter the Great ordered 700 citizens butchered because they declined to take an oath of allegiance.

The Omsk Museum was a principal point of interest for tourists because of the Steppes, or barren plains of Western Siberia, which includes

many prehistoric specimens.

Long a Cossack centre, the Siberian Cossaeks found Omsk a conver ient rallying place to resist the Bol-shevik influences which appealed strongly to a foreign or mixed element in Russia that has no countermany of the colonists sent to Siberia by the Government, and also of many political exiles, are of good Russian

# Y.M.C.A's Good Service



Help Continue Work for Soldiers and for Canada.



believe," said Lieut.-General Sir Arthur Currie one day in March, 1918, while the fate of the world was trembling in the balance, "that the authorities should recognize the extremely valuable factor the Y.M.C.A. is in winning battles, and I think you ought to have the personnel and equipment necessary to carry on your work ..... I do not see how, with the men and materials you have, you can do more than you are doing. But if you can, do so. We need it and appreciate it."

Every public institution is rightfully subject to criticism. The Young Men's Christian Association is no exception. The very magnitude of the Y.M.C.A's work for the soldiers brought it under the white light of criticism. But its record of four and a half years has not been successfully assailed.

For every dollar of gross profits made in Y.M.C.A. canteens it was necessary to raise a dollar and a half by public subscription to meet the total expenses of the Overseas services. It will be seen therefore, that absolutely all profits were absorbed in the cost of the service to the soldiers.

The policy of the Y.M.C.A. in its war work was primarily free service, not free supplies, but nevertheless, since December 31st, 1916, soldiers in the Canadian Corps area in France, Belgium and Germany were supplied tea, coffee, cocoa, orangeade and lemonade at the "Y" free. Also cigarettes, chocolate, bis-

cuits, etc. were given free to walking wounded, stretcher bearers, and working parties in cases of emergency. In addition 5% of the sales was distributed among units in the war zone to be spent on extra rations, comforts, etc. for the men. Supplies and cash given away during 1918 amounted to \$299,650.28.

The prices charged in the Y.M.C.A. canteens were fixed by the British War office and were the same as those charged throughout the British Army. These prices were fixed for the protection of the soldiers, and were from 50% to 100% lower than prevailing prices in overseas civilian stores. They were also as low or lower than retail prices in Canada.
