The London Daily News Refers to Canada's Stand.

ONLY CROWN'S VIRTUES ARE ITS SUPPORTS OR ITS BUTTRESSES.

De Valera and Other Irish Delegates Get British Passes to Go to Paris to Represent Their Peace Congress.

London, May 6.—The Daily News, commenting on the story of Ottawa correspondents of what has taken place in Canada in regard to honors, says: "It is clear that the title business so far as Canada is concerned, is doomed, and when it is achieved, the British commonwealth will owe a very conspicuous debt of gratitude to the Dominion."

Get British Passes. Dublin, Ireland, May 6.—The British Government has issued passports for Edmund De Valera, Arthur Griffith, and Count Plunkett to go to Paris to represent their peace congress.

In Apartment House Fire at Columbus, Ohio.

Columbus, Ohio, May 6.—Seven persons are known to have perished and a dozen were injured, several probably fatally, in a fire which destroyed a six storey apartment house in the downtown section shortly after midnight this morning.

MUNICH CELEBRATES SOVIET'S DOWNFALL

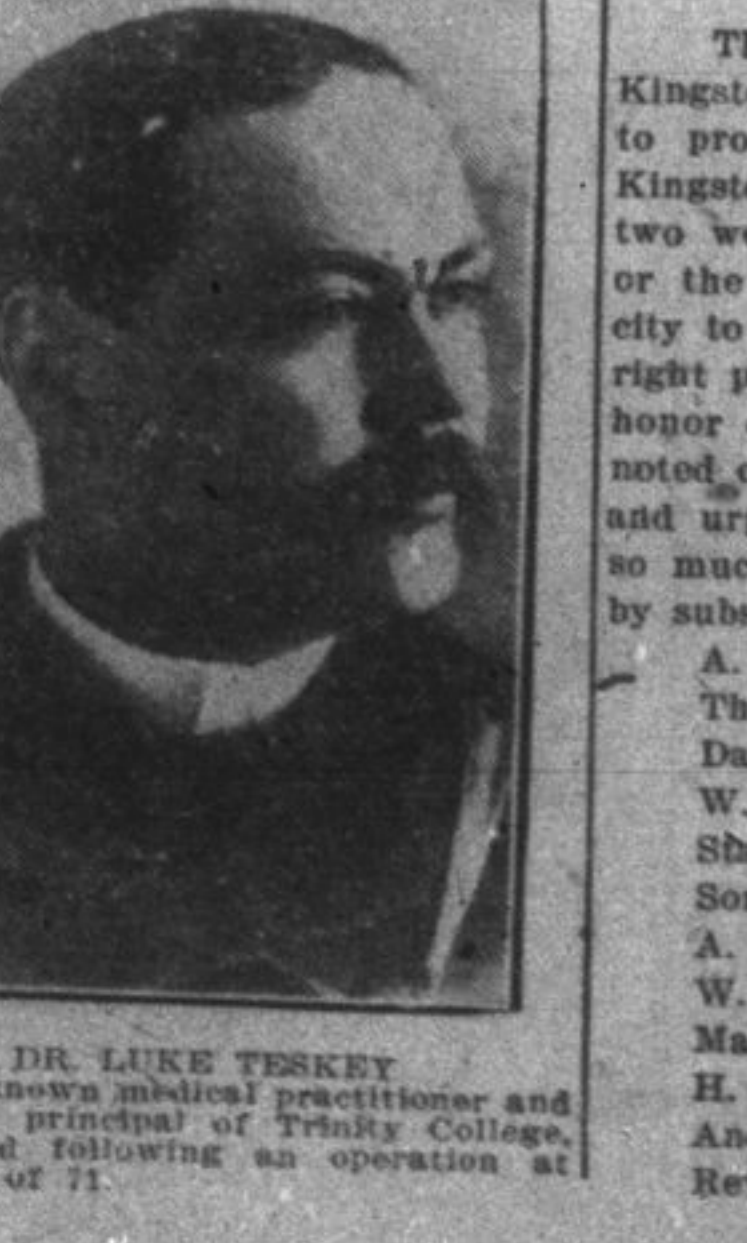
People Cheered the Troops and Sang Patriotic Anthems—Bavarian Army Dissolved.

FRACTURE OF THE SKULL

Result of the Coroner's Inquest Regarding Late Daniel Gallivan.

According to Evidence of Dr. W. T. Connell—There Was Some Dynamite in the House—Death a Mystery.

The above is the verdict rendered by a jury presided over by Coroner Dr. D. E. Mundell in the police court room on Monday night, and which was empanelled to enquire into the circumstances surrounding the death of Daniel Gallivan, whose dead body was found on Sunday morning in the ruins of the home of John Gunn, Sr., on Thomas street after the house had been gutted by fire.

The police court room was filled with spectators for the hearing of the evidence. A dozen witnesses were heard, and it was not until midnight when the verdict was rendered. Crown Attorney Whiting was present and examined the witnesses.

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DYNAMITE IN THE CELLAR.

Continuing his evidence, Chief Armstrong stated that Gunn appeared on the scene about 3.30 o'clock.

He was excited, and asked if he could get something out of the house. He appeared to be very anxious to get out a stove. Gunn also stated that there were three sticks of dynamite, with caps and powder, in the cellar.

Witness did not know about the finding of a body in the ruins until 8.15 a.m. He stated that in all his experience he never saw a fire so evenly burnt.

Asked by Mr. Whiting as to how long he thought the fire had been burning when he arrived, witness said he thought it had been burning about twenty minutes or half an hour.
