### Get British Passes.

Qublin, Ireland, May 6-The British Government has issued passports for Edmund De Valera, Arthur Griffith, and Count Plunkett to go to Paris to represent their peace congress. This was announced by Frank P. Walsh, as he left unexpectedly yesterday for London.

"In the swift movement of world affairs," said Mr. Walsh before leaving, "especially in labor matters, it may soon be thought a little thing to ask for self-determination of a small nation."

## Italy To Sign Peace Treaty
