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EXPLAINS TO G. W. V. A. INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

WITH REGARD TO APPOINTMENT OF GARBAGE INSPECTOR.

The Association Endorses the "Y" Campaign—J. W. Connor Resigns As Honorary Treasurer.

At the G.W.V.A. meeting on Monday evening, Mayor Newman discussed the action of the City Council in not appointing a returned soldier to the position of garbage inspector.

Mayor Newman said that all cities were taking up the Y.M.C.A. campaign enthusiastically, not perhaps quite so enthusiastically as in the past as it was thought by some citizens that the work was practically over and that the Y.M.C.A. work was finished, but it should be remembered that since the 1st of January the Y.M.C.A. had been borrowing to make up their funds, and that there was still a large amount of work to be done by them amongst returning soldiers and their dependants.

Major Hooper, O.C. Dispersal Area also spoke on the work of the Y.M.C.A. and asked for the names of volunteers to assist in the campaign.

Discussion followed, and the following resolution was adopted: "That the Association heartily endorse the present Y.M.C.A. campaign, and is in favour of comrades volunteering to co-operate with the campaign committee in canvassing the city."

The names of many volunteers were then received, and any other members wishing to volunteer for this work are requested to attend the organization meeting in the City Hall Tuesday at 8 p.m.

Sixteen new members whose applications had been received since last meeting were received into the Association.

Further resolutions for discussion at the Provincial Convention were then discussed, and adopted as follows: "That the present pension scheme be amended to increase the total disability pension for the rank and file, and the allowance for widows, orphans and widowed mothers who draw pensions on account of a soldier's death."

Nominations for delegates to the Provincial Convention were received to replace Com. L. F. Goodwin, who found he was unable to attend. Comrade W. A. Stroud was elected to represent this branch of the Association.

Amongst other correspondence was a letter from Comrade J. W. Connor, Honorary Treasurer, in which he tendered his resignation on the grounds of ill-health. Com. Connor has been one of the most able and willing workers for the branch, holding the position of Honorary Treasurer during three terms of office, carrying out his duties, (which have been at times most arduous) to the great satisfaction of the branch, and in a most efficient manner. He was also one of the delegates elected to represent this branch at the last convention.

Great appreciation of this comrade's work, and regret that his health would not permit of his retaining office in the association was expressed. A vote of thanks was carried unanimously to Comrade Connor and tendered.
