THE DANGERS OF CANADA

(Continued from Page 1.)

pends, said the speaker, upon the sturdy resolve to refuse the counsellors who flatter and bribe, and to choose those who bring their judgment as well as their sympathy to the national service, as the free and trusted representatives of the people. And it may be reasonably hoped that neither jingoes nor "little Englanders" will be able in the future any more than in the past to persuade the great bulk of the people from the path of reason, ableness and justice; liberty and peace; not only for themselves, but for all the world.

For ultimately Canada is not something divorced from the common will of the people of Canada. It is that common will or more correctly their rational will, articulating itself in the institutions, laws and government. It is not the government, it is not a social or political contract, it is the realization of every individual of his highest good as a member of a social organism and as an integral part of an organic whole.

Dangers From Within.

Therefore Canada's destiny lies in her own hands. Canada is what her sons have made her. Canada will be what her sons desire her to become. The dangers that lie before her are not from without, they are from within. For Canada is not only a place on the map, it is not even the sum of all the people who are in Canada, it is a unity which is over more than a sum, it is an idea, an aspiration, an ideal, which partly is and wholly hopes to be. We must, therefore, look at some of the dangers which may threaten the destiny of Canada in the future.

1. The question of immigration. It is safe to say that whatever mistakes we have made in the past we should in future receive no one into this country whom we cannot assimilate into our population and make a good Canadian. We have not always done this.

2. The question of language and education. The question of whether we shall have two or 30 languages. Personally I am of the opinion that two will serve the destiny of Canada better than 30. In the matter of education we have learned that men may be morally shaped by education. It is therefore only a matter of time before the moral character of our people, his attainments, should be permitted to teach in Canadian schools colleges or universities who has no sympathy with Canadian ideals and aspirations. I should oppose for example an interchange of professors between Canada and Germany, the far greater extent than we are prepared to admit the future ideals of a country are in the hands of its universities.

3. Greater than all other dangers at the present moment is a flaming paganism which in the past, wrecked Germany and which unless we take care bids fair to wreck the conquerors of Germany. Its creed in its present form among us is the most vicious individualism that he will take who has the power and he will hold who has the expert. The nation of the natural resources of this country should cease. Concessions to companies or syndicates which in the long run can only minister to private greed, must cease. If the epic of war and plunder is foreign to the genius of Canada and repugnant to her people, it is repugnant to her people. The epic of force and gain become.

Hopeful Signs.

There are many hopeful signs in the public life of Canada. The first is one which she has inherited from a jealous eye—an untrammelled press, the next is the public discussion of public questions, not only in party caucus but in public debate. Every school house should have its debating club, every trades union and every fraternal organization should within the limit of its constitution discuss public questions. Sir J. S. Willison remarking recently upon the necessity of public discussion that "the ward meetings, the party conventions do more to determine the standards of public life than the Canadian Club or any other superior people who regard politics as mean and sordid."

Therefore, for the sake of Canada patriots must enter public life and therefore fairer treatment must be accorded the public men of Canada. But nothing will ever take the place of the vigorous clash of argument in the parliament of this country. There the utmost attitude must be allowed the representatives of the people. Their patriotic lethargy must be stirred into life and patriotic pretentiousness sink into silence. Men of large calibre have contributed to the making of Canada we must see to it that men of large calibre continue to have large measure in shaping her destiny.

At the conclusion Dr. Wilson was heartily applauded vigorously and in tendering the appreciation of the Canadian Club J. G. Elliott, the president, stated that he had no doubt that each member present would consider it an honour to propose a vote of thanks if there were time. However, Mr. Elliott graciously thanked Rev. Dr. Wilson and commented briefly on the necessity for the education of Canadians in a manner in accordance with Canadian ideals.
