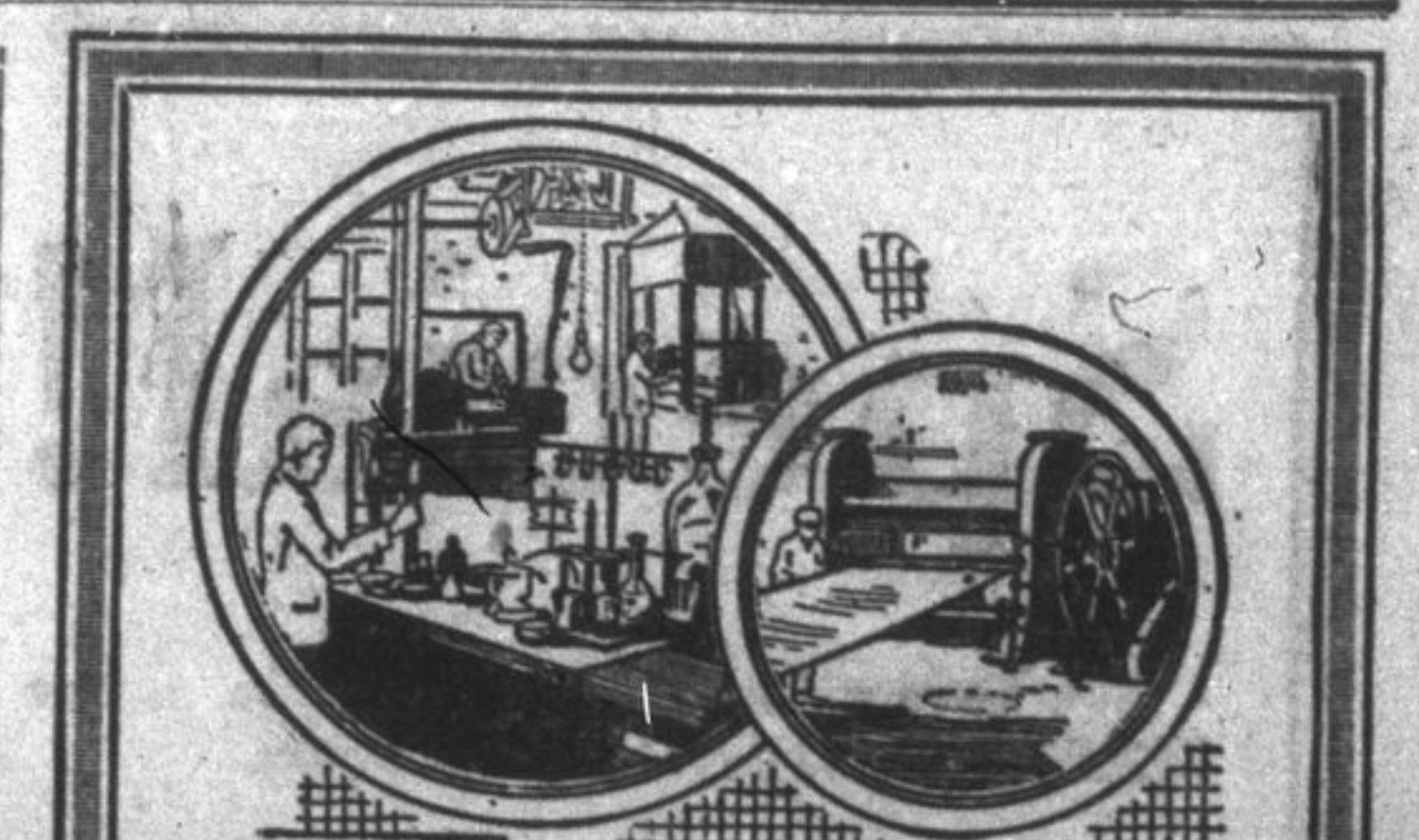

Better Citizenship. The Ontario legislature recently put through a bill whereby they will donate one-quarter of the sum for any township that puts up a community house and athletic field, each township to have only one town or village receive said grant from the government. The size of the field is to be three acres, and the Ontario branch of the A.A.U. of C. are to help supervise the laying out of the athletic field, and when completed are to assist in organizing sport in that particular section of the province. Athletic meets will also be held. So far Unionville is the only village to apply for a grant of \$2,500 to help them erect a \$10,000 community house and athletic field.
