Orders have been issued at Washington for recruiting eight thousand men to relieve Americans in Siberia. The men are to be sent in units of five hundred from San Francisco.

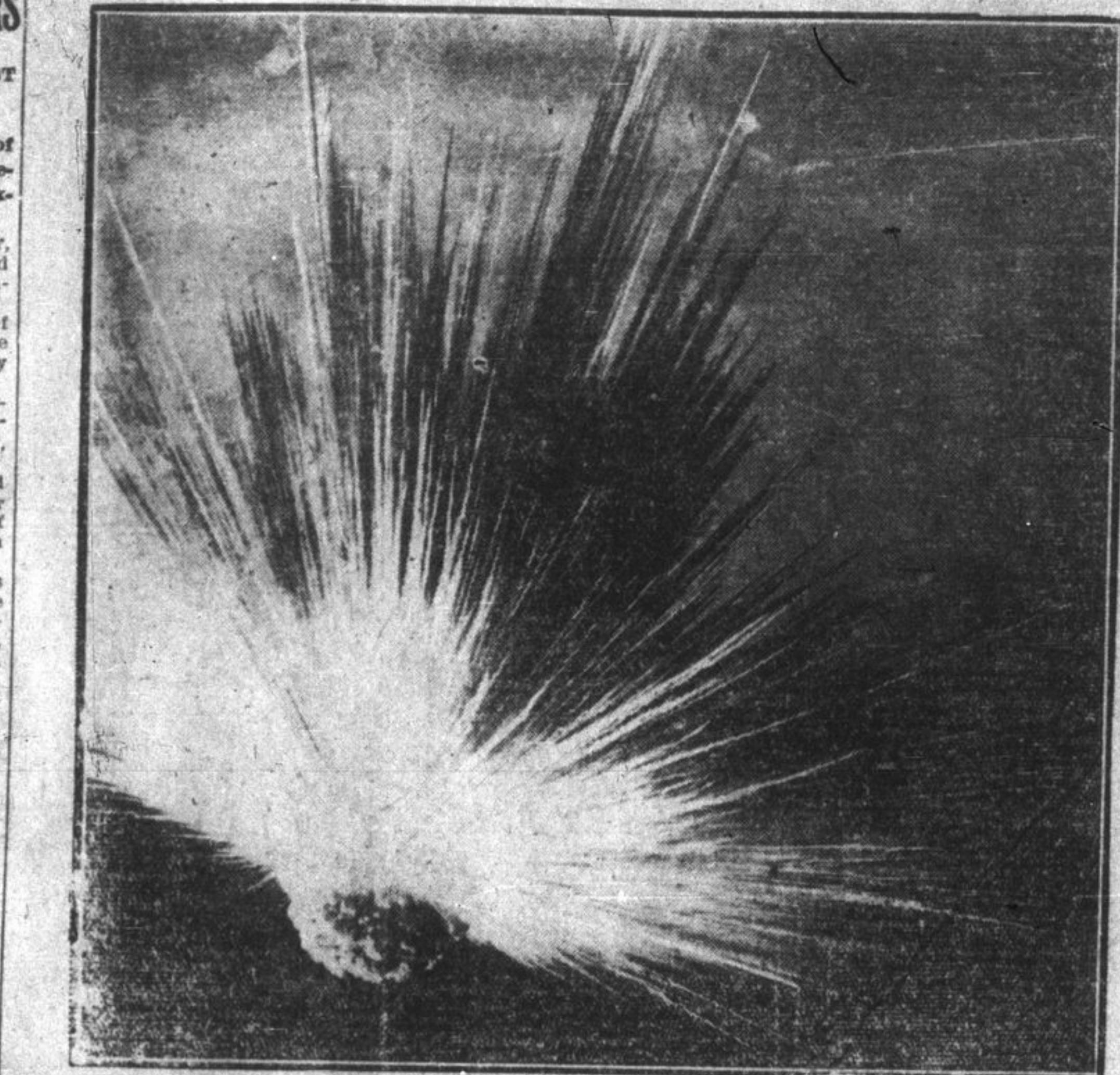

WHO INVITED THEM?

Some Say Wilson and Others That Lloyd George Was Privy.

London, May 8.—The visit of representatives of American-Irish societies of Ireland is creating great interest in Sinn Fein circles there and equal indignation in Unionist quarters in Ireland and England. Among the reports in circulation is one that passports from Paris were granted to Ireland at the request of President Wilson. There were also reports that Premier Lloyd George promised to receive the delegates of the American-Irish societies and advised them to visit Belfast.

There is considerable mystery about the whole affair and it is unknown whether Premier Lloyd George has been in communication with the visitors at all. There is one report that he promised to receive them, but has cancelled his engagement for the interview. A question was addressed to the government in the house of commons on Wednesday with a view to establishing whether the envoys are accredited to the United States government, and

also to establish their exact status. It was also asked if the premier had intended to receive them. The question was met evasively by the home secretary, who promised to make inquiries and said that this would occupy a week.

While according to some despatches from Ireland, the Sinn Feiners are greatly encouraged and believe the creation of an Irish republic is within sight, the Unionist press here is calling for an explanation from Premier Lloyd George and criticizing President Wilson's alleged interference in British domestic affairs.

"If it is true that Mr. Wilson is behind this intrigue against the union of the United Kingdom—and after the president's behaviour toward Italy anything is credible—the American ambassador," says The Post, "ought to be told that the United Kingdom does not tolerate interference in its domestic affairs. They are our business and the business of nobody else."

The Graphic says: "If any of the states of America were again to demand the right to secede from the union, it is certain the American people would be bitterly indignant if

such a demand received any kind of official encouragement from Great Britain. We apply the same standard of judgment to American interference in our affairs."

DEFENDERS OF FLAG WERE STARVED OUT

Italian Troops Accused of Maltreating the Greeks on Scarpanto Islands.

Salonica, May 8.—Reports received here from Scarpanto Islands in the Aegean Sea, coming by way of Crete, are to the effect that the Italian troops of occupation attempted to take down the Greek flag, hoisted on Easter Day, in the village of Athos after the proclamation of the Union of the Dodecanese Islands with Greece. The population, composed mostly of women and old men, opposed with heroic resistance.

An old woman named Panayiotakis, with several other women, who were protecting the Greek flag, was killed, and a priest was shot by the Italians. In the village of Menetes three old men and sixty women who were protecting the flag were starved out and compelled to surrender. The Archbishop of Scarpanto is reported to have been seriously wounded by the Italian carabinieri.

A Greek sailing vessel off the Gasso Islands reports a devastating fire by guns on the villages of Arvanthori and Murina. The vessels was prevented by gunfire from approaching the scene.

Miss Margaret Isabel Graham died at the Graham homestead, Sidney, on Sunday. Miss Graham had recently been in Toronto at the General Hospital, where she underwent a serious operation.
