Orders have been issued at Washington for recruiting eight thousand men to relieve Americans in Siberia. The men are to be sent in units of five hundred from San Francisco.



WERE STARVED OUT

Italian Troops Accused of Maltreating the Greeks on Scarpante Islands.

Salonica, May 8 .- Reports receiv ed here from Scarpanto Islands the Aegean Sea, coming by way of Crete, are to the effect that the Ita!ian troops of occupation attempted to take down the Greek flag, hoisted on Easter Day, in the village of Athos after the proclamation of the Union of the Dodecarez Islands with Greece.
