### STRIKE MAY BE ADJUSTED

IN TWO WEEKS' TIME IS AN OPINION EXPRESSED.

No Change in the Locomotive Works Situation—The Men are Sanguine Respecting the Outcome.

The situation regarding the strike of the Canadian Locomotive Company's employees remains unchanged. This was the statement made Saturday morning by Mr. Wallace, president of the company. The plant is absolutely closed, and the clerical staff is dispersed. The workmen apparently refrained from leaving in the vicinity of the works. Their rooms on Brock street are thronged every hour of the day, and all seem to be very sanguine respecting the outcome of their action. No estimate is given of the time required to elapse before a settlement is reached, and they can once more resume work. Negotiations have not taken place in an endeavor to reach a settlement since the walkout.

It is stated among the men that when the company received the demand for an eight-hour day and an advance in wages, the reply was "that when five companies in Canada employing over five hundred men can meet the demand, we will do the same," but before making any inquiry respecting the position of the company the men took a strike vote, and it went 10 to 1 for a walkout, indicating the thoroughness of the agitation that had been carried on up to that point.

The local executive states that the response has been practically unanimous throughout Ontario, the last report received from Toronto stating that 4,000 men were out there.

Mr. Findlay, president of the Kingston branch of the Metal Workers' Federation, states that the Federation does not pay an indemnity to strikers, but that this must be paid by the particular union to which the men belong, and the amount is determined by the unions themselves. This does not seem to be well understood by the men of the different trades, as many of them think that they are to be paid by the Metal Workers' Federation, with which they amalgamated a few weeks ago.

Up to the present time nothing has taken place toward a settlement of the dispute. Mr. Findlay stated that it might possibly be adjusted in two weeks' time, but no change was expected within that time. Volunteers have been called for picket duty.

### SATURDAY'S MARKET.

Produce Was Plentiful But Prices Were High.

There was a good crowd of farmers and housewives at the market on Saturday morning. The prices of butter ranged from 55 to 58 cents a pound. Eggs were plentiful, and sold at 45 to 50 cents a dozen. Dressed chickens were fairly plentiful, but were dear, the price for decent birds being \$2 to \$2.25.

In the meat section, veal was present in large quantities. It sold at 16 and 18 cents per pound for forequarters and 21 to 23 cents a pound for hindquarters. A number of young pigs were for sale and brought \$20 to \$23 a pair. Smoked hams sold at 33 cents a pound. Vegetables sold at the usual prices. Lettuce sold at 5 and 10 cents, and radishes at 5 and 10 cents. Other commodities were unchanged in price.

Kingston Truck and Cartage Co. A new business enterprise has been launched in Kingston by the formation of the Kingston Truck and Cartage Company. The principals in the new venture are Geo. E. Smith and John C. Hunter, who are too well known to need any introduction to Kingstonians. The decision of the Sheldon Forwarding Company to cease business leaves an opening for a progressive cartage company to fill the vacancy, and this is what the new company proposes to do. It will operate a number of motor lorries of five-ton capacity for heavy freight, and also a number of lighter ones for lighter work. One or two of these lorries are already in commission, and others are expected to reach the city soon. The company is thus splendidly prepared for the transportation of railway and steamship freight and general business. Its announcement to the public appears on another page of to-day's issue.
