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# KINGSTON'S CLEAN-UP WEEK

## CITIZENS ASKED TO TIDY UP THEIR PREMISES.

Object of the Clean-up Week—Let Everybody Dig In Who Has Not Done So.

The "spring clean-up week" begins on Monday next according to the proclamation of Mayor Newman, which was issued on Friday, and the householders and business men of the city are urged to take a keen interest in the work by seeing that the request is literally carried into effect.

The object of the clean-up week is threefold: First cleanliness is necessary to health, and the medical health officer is expected to see that reasonable measures to ensure sanitation for the benefit of the community are carried out. For this purpose an official called the sanitary inspector visits all back premises in the city once a year, and authority is given for the prosecution of persons who fail to keep their premises clean. This means that all refuse and kitchen waste should be placed in a suitable garbage cans having a cover, and not thrown about sheds and yards.

Next the danger from fire is removed if all combustible materials are kept in proper receptacles and not allowed to accumulate in cellars, attics, and closets. The cellar and attic as well as unused rooms should be kept in proper order. Papers and rags should not be permitted to litter the floors or accumulate in corners and in closets.

And third, it is a pleasing thing to see order and cleanliness everywhere; it raises the moral tone of any community. If these things are extended, the logical sequence is the employment of the painter and glazier, the carpenter and the paperhanger, and the result is that the appearance of the city is greatly improved.

Let everybody begin on Monday morning and arrange with a carter for the removal of the winter's ashes, cans and bottles, and place fly screens on every window from the cellar up. The fly screens cannot be placed on too soon. Permanent screens should be used if possible.

Shopkeepers should be particular to clean up cellars and storerooms in order to avoid fire.
