With Name of Filler and Weight and Measure.

Ottawa, May 14.—Milk dealers found champions in the House yesterday afternoon, when the resolution that all cans, cartons, bottles, boxes, barrels, etc., containing human food supplies should be marked, stamped and branded with the name and address of the fillers, besides the weight and measures of the contents, J. A. Robb stated it was a hardship on the milk dealers, while A. R. McMaster suggested if the bill based on this resolution passed the milk dealers be given time to replace the bottles. The resolution passed, and the bill got its first reading. This was the same bill that was rejected by the Senate last year.

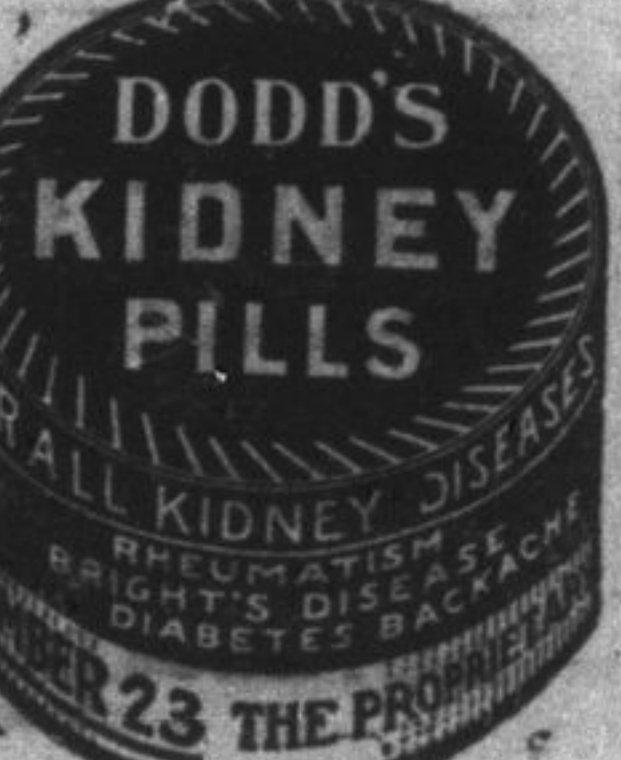

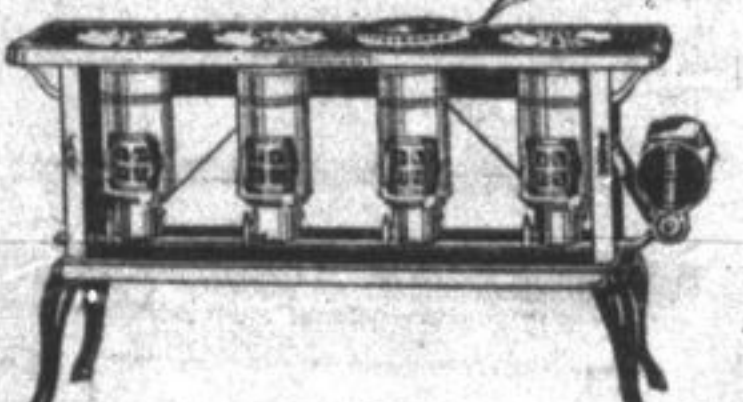
