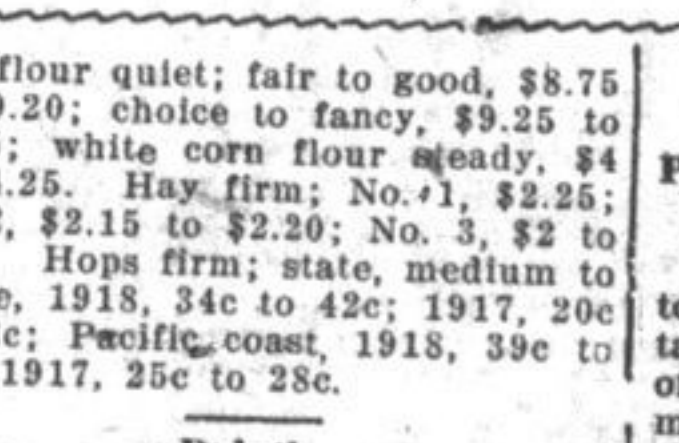

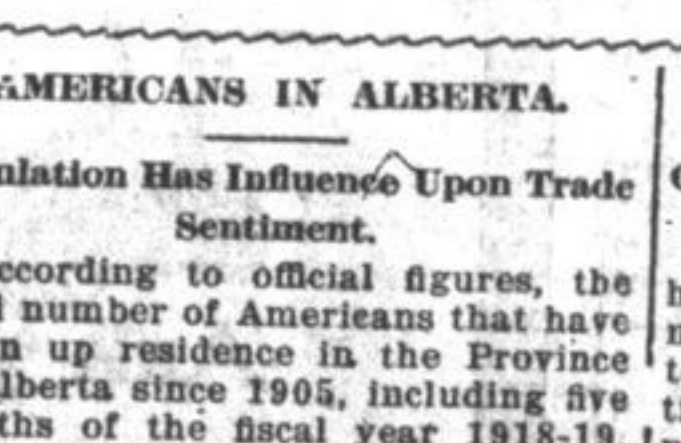

AMERICANS IN ALBERTA. Population Has Influenced Upon Trade Sentiment. According to official figures, the total number of American immigrants taken up residence in the Province of Alberta since 1905, including five months of the fiscal year 1918-19, reaches 275,093. In 1905 the Province of Alberta was organized, and statistical information has been kept since that date of the immigration into the three provinces, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta. Saskatchewan ranks second, with 226,339 immigrants; and Manitoba third, with only 78,789. The largest immigration into Alberta from the United States came in 1908-19, numbered 5,613. The total population of Alberta in 1916 was given officially as 496,525.



PRESENTATION AT STELLA. Of Medals to Amherst Island's Returned Soldiers. Stella, May 12.—A gathering was held in Victoria hall on Friday afternoon for the presentation of medals to soldier boys. Our Fire Losses. Fire losses are greater in Canada than in any other part of the world, and greater in Ontario than in any other part of Canada. A recent report contains figures showing the appalling fire loss per capita in the various countries in the world in 1916. In Canada it amounted to \$3.24, while in Ontario it was \$4.61; in the United States, \$2.26; Great Britain, 64 cents; Russia, 27 cents, and Germany 28 cents.

British Trade Ambassadors. The Federation of British Industries, representing sixteen thousand manufacturers and \$25,000,000,000 capital, is organizing a great system of trade ambassadors for the extension of British trade overseas. The federation expects to have an ambassador in every important centre.
