OBITUARY

Late Pte. Harry Slater.

Pte. Harry Slater, late of the 21st Battalion C.E.F., passed away at the Mowat hospital on Sunday, after an illness extending over three years. He enlisted in the 21st and served with it in France. He was gassed and was invalided to Canada in June, 1916. After apparent recovery, he was discharged but was again admitted to the hospital in June, 1917. Deceased was born in England where a sister resides. He was single, but had friends at Gratiot, Ont., where he resided before enlistment, and the body was sent there for interment by M. P. Keys, undertaker.

The Late Mrs. Annie Savage.

Annie Savage, widow of the late James Savage, and formerly Mrs. Arthur, passed away on Sunday at her residence, 288 Barrie street. She had been ill during the past seven months, and she is the sixth member of her family to die within a period of five years. Two sons, Robert and Arthur, met a fatal accident in 1914 on the Cusheford crossing of the C.T.R., a third son, James, dropped dead in November, 1915, while on guard duty with the 14th P.W.O.R., James Savage, her husband, passed away in May, 1916, and Mrs. Wallace Moxie, a daughter, was a victim of the flu epidemic in November last. The funeral will take place from St. Paul's church on Tuesday, Rev. W. J. Fitzgerald officiating.

The Late Mrs. H. Tandy.

The death of Miss Monday, wife of Henry Tandy, occurred at her residence, 161 King street on Sunday. She had been in failing health for several months but not until three weeks ago were any serious symptoms manifested. Deceased was seventy-two years of age and was born in Montreal and came to Kingston with her husband fifty years ago. She possessed a wide acquaintance in the city through social and church circles in which she was always popular. She possessed a kindly and sympathetic manner which endeared her to friends. Besides her husband she is survived by two sons, George of Philadelphia, and Tom of Seattle; and two daughters Lettice at home and Mrs. Davoud of Salt Lake City.

FLIGHT-LIEUT. CARSON HOME.

Major C. F. Carson is Also Coming With His Family.

On Sunday morning Flight-Lieut. Orrin A. Carson, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Carson, Barrie street, arrived home after two years' service overseas. Flight-Lieut. Carson enlisted in the 72nd Battery as a gunner, and after a short period of service in France was transferred to the Royal Air Force and had just completed his training when the Armistice was signed.

His brother, Major C. F. Carson, M.C., Mrs. Carson and their twin sons are also expected to arrive in Kingston shortly. Major Carson, who was a distinguished graduate of the R.M.C. in 1905 and also of the Chatham School of Engineering, was stationed at Lahore, India, at the outbreak of war. He assisted in the mobilization of two contingents of the Indian army, and was on the permanent staff in France as a captain. Later he asked to be transferred to the front, and was placed in command of two engineer companies. During his term of service he won the Military Cross with two bars, and was also mentioned in despatches on several occasions. Major Carson will return to India after a short visit here.

SHORTER HOURS FOR CLERKS

RETAIL DRY GOODS MERCHANTS REDUCE WORKING HOURS.

Decision Was Reached At Meeting On Saturday—R. Waldron Has Instituted a Forty-one Hour Week.

At a meeting of the retail dry goods merchants on Saturday it was decided that henceforth the stores will close during the whole year at five o'clock. Hitherto the closing hour has been six o'clock except in the summer months when the extra hour was granted. The action of the employers is being appreciated greatly by the clerks and satisfaction was expressed by them on Monday morning. The firms who have agreed to the new hours include all the representative dry goods firms in the city, and the new time will go into effect during the week.

The old-established firm of R. Waldron has also made a response to the popular demand for shorter hours, and announcement was made on Monday that a forty-one hour week had been instituted. This will mean that henceforth the clerks will report for the day's work at nine o'clock and the stores will close at five o'clock except on Saturdays when the closing hour will be at six o'clock.

This will mean a reduction of thirteen hours a week for the clerks. It now appears probable that other businesses in the city may follow suit as the matter has been under discussion by the Retail Merchants' Association. A committee was appointed at the last meeting to interview the merchants to obtain expressions of opinion and it is expected that the committee will report its findings at the next meeting on Thursday night.
