## At the Theatres

Miss Anja Stewart returns to the ranks of the screen stars in this picture. Miss Stewart plays the part of Amy Forrester, whose domestic troubles as the wife of Andrew Forrester, a social Bohemian, have provided thousands of women with word pictures of their own wifely problems.

Local theatre-goers who have read the book, or the story as it was published serially, will find that the film production keeps close in the action to the various developments of the printed version. Miss Stewart's supporting cast includes Mrs. DeWolf Hopper, wife of the famous comedian now starring in "Everything" at the New York Hippodrome; Conway Tearle, a star from the legitimate stage; William Boyd, well known to critical theatre audiences as leading man in a number of the big stage plays of the last three years, and Edwin Arden, peer of actors delineating the characters of men married to women who feel no sense of obligation in their wedded life.

Mrs. Hopper has the part of Irma Delabarre, a society leader described as "lily of beauty with pollen of deadly poison"; Conway Tearle plays opposite Miss Stewart as the husband, Andrew Forrester; William Boyd impersonates the character of Monte Bracken, a social "crocodile," and Edwin Arden is seen in the role of Maurice Delabarre, Irma's husband, who tries to apply the ideas of the last generation to the conduct and principles of modern society. This picture is a gorgeous production, and should be seen by everyone. The title alone is a challenge to curiosity, and should attract large crowds.—Adv.

"Tea for Three" is the rather sociable title of the comedy which Miss Elsa Ryan brings to the Grand on Tuesday evening, May 20th. Written by that well-known dramatist, Roi Cooper Mergue, whom recent critics have compared favorably to George Bernard Shaw, the author, described the piece as "An angle on—of the triangle." The distinction seems to be well taken. The mere suggestion of intrigues and liaisons of a triangular character is sufficient nowadays to turn people away. But "Tea for Three" is decidedly not such a play. The piece disclosed a delicious sense of humor, distinctly different in flavor from comedies that have gone before, and keeps its audience highly entertained throughout the three acts.—Adv.

## GANANOQUE

(From Our Own Correspondent)  
May 18.—Pte. Arthur Barker arrived here on Saturday afternoon and was given an enthusiastic reception by Mayor Wilson, delegations from the town council and a large number of citizens. Yesterday afternoon Pte. Gerald Mills, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Mills, Hickory street, arrived on the early train and Ptes. William Weir and Angus McDonald on the later train. All were met by Mayor Wilson and a large concourse of citizens and were heralded by local whistles.

Dr. A. S. Grant of Toronto conducted the special anniversary services of the congregation of St. Andrew's church yesterday and was greeted by large congregations throughout the day. The evening service in Grace Methodist church was withdrawn and the congregation worshipped with the sister congregation.

At the session of the Board of Education during the past week the following increases in the salaries of the High and Public school teachers were granted. Mr. Lewis and Miss Edwards of the High school staff were increased to \$1,200 and Miss Johnston to \$1,300, with a bonus of \$50 to each of them completing the year ending June, 1920. The public school staff, including the principal, were granted an increase of ten per cent. on present salary, with a bonus of 7 1/2 per cent. to each of them who completes the year ending June, 1920. The salary of Principal J. J. Bell of the high school was left over till the next meeting of the Board and the salary of Miss M. M. Carpenter was increased to \$950 with a 7 1/2 per cent. bonus.

A very interesting debate on church union was held on Friday evening in the lecture hall of Grace church under the auspices of their Y.E.S. The topic was, "Resolved that Church Union is for the best interests and advancement of Christ's kingdom." The affirmative was upheld by Reeve Thomas I. Ellis and Rev. W. S. Lennon, and Town Councilor Clifford Sine and Jas. G. Lawson defended the negative. Rev. C. W. Hollingsworth, Mrs. B. O. Britton and Miss Nellie Lake acted as judges and gave decision in favor of the affirmative by a margin of three points.

There was another large offering of live hogs on the market on Saturday which was all taken by local buyers for shipment, the prevailing price still holding at 20 1/2 cents a pound. Miss Margaret Edwards entertained about fifty of her young friends

at the summer home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Edwards Jr., at Batteau Point on Friday evening. W. C. McCarney, manager of the provincial hotel, who has been seriously ill with pneumonia for some time past, has recovered. Rev. William Gardner, pastor of the Clayton, N.Y., Methodist church, at the parsonage on Thursday afternoon, united in marriage Miss Marjorie Wilcox of this town, to William C. Martin, of Kenosha, Wis. Mr. and Mrs. Martin left for their new home on Friday morning.

Miss Freda Chevis, daughter of Chief of Police and Mrs. William Chevis, who recently underwent an operation for appendicitis in Kingston General Hospital, has so far recovered as to be able to return home.

Miss Louise Bates, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Bates, Brock street, who underwent an operation for appendicitis in Kingston hospital during the past week, is reported as making excellent progress towards recovery.

Mrs. Hugh Wilson, Pine street, who spent the past winter in California and later with her daughter, Mrs. Cecil W. Sherrin, at Pelican Rapids, Wis., has returned to town.

Robert A. Greer, of Montreal, a former resident of this town, who has been spending the past week with relatives and friends, left for home yesterday afternoon.

At a special meeting of the Renfrew Board of Education on Friday a report recommending salary increases for the teaching staffs of the schools found acceptance.

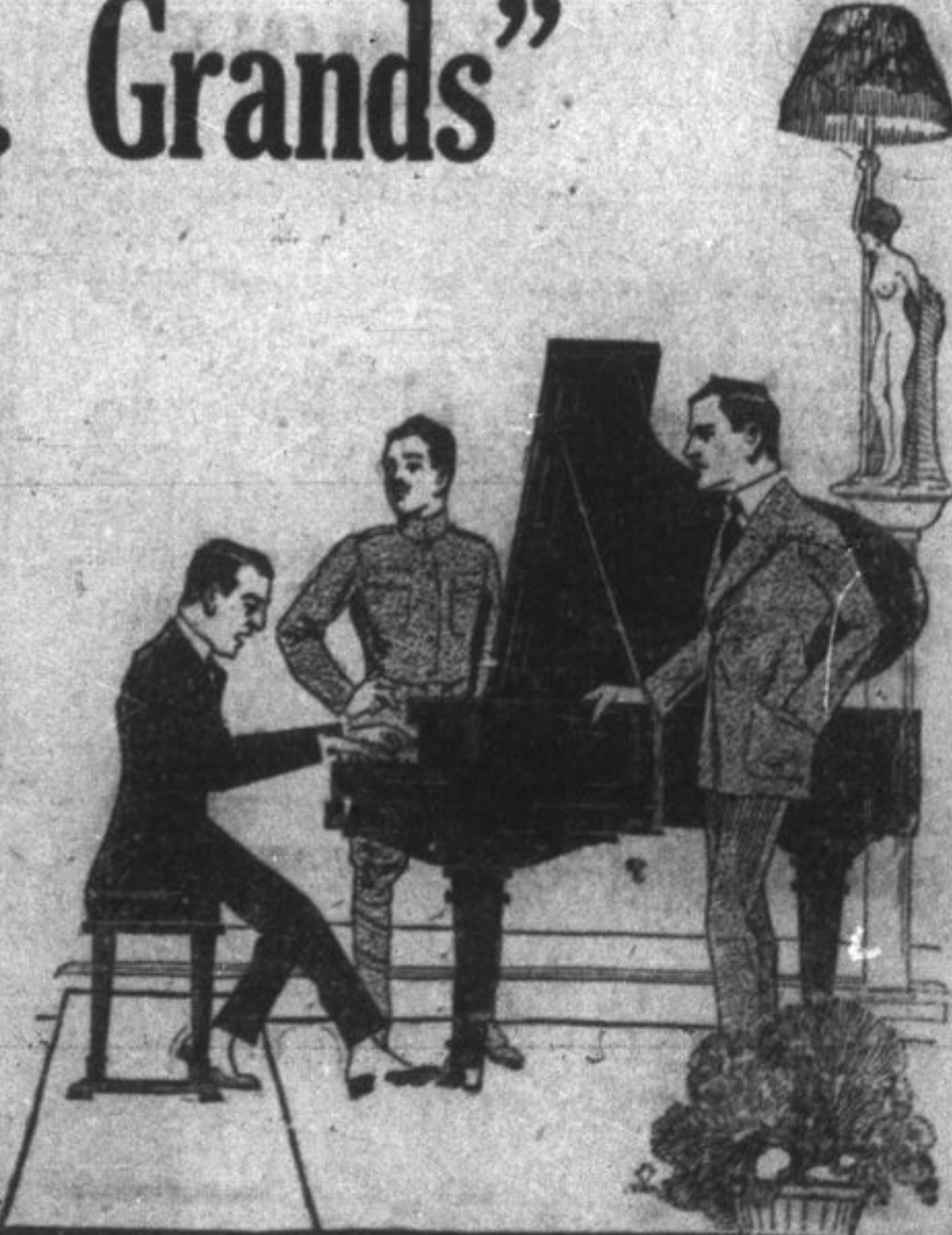
