WITHIN THE EMPIRE Premier Borden Explains Can-

ada's Status as a Peace Treaty Signatory. London, May 19 .- "Canada's status as a signatory to the peace treaty is that of an equal nation, but within the British Empire, said Sir

Robert Borden. Premier Borden returned from Paris on Wednesday and sailed for Canada yesterday. He has had audiences with the King and Prince of Wales and interviews with Canadian representatives in London. Discussing the Dominion's position at Paris the Premier made it clear that Canada had stood firm on the status of a self-governing nation, which it has proved itself to be during the war, and that status has been acknowledged during the framing of peace and the establishment of the League of Nations. He regarded the Empire itself as a League of Nations. As regards the German indemnity, Canada would share in proportion to its expendi-

tures on pensions and such other heads as came under the treaty provisions. The Dominion's shipping losses would also be replaced proportionately. 

Peak Loads
