"You make mountains out of mole-hills, Bab. But don't look so serious. I have promised, haven't I?"

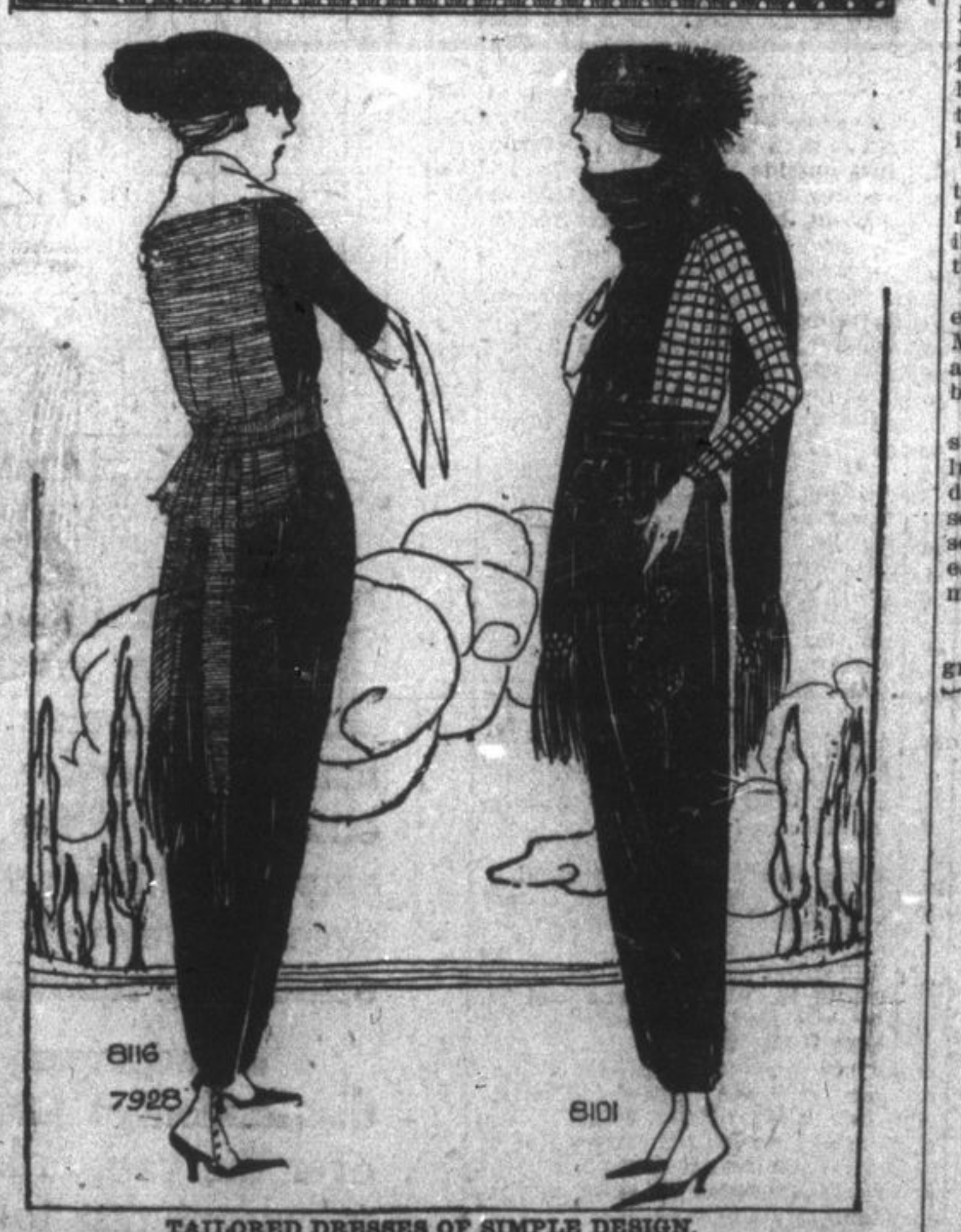
"Yes, dear." But somehow I hadn't the faith in his promises I used to have. But I wouldn't let him see it.


