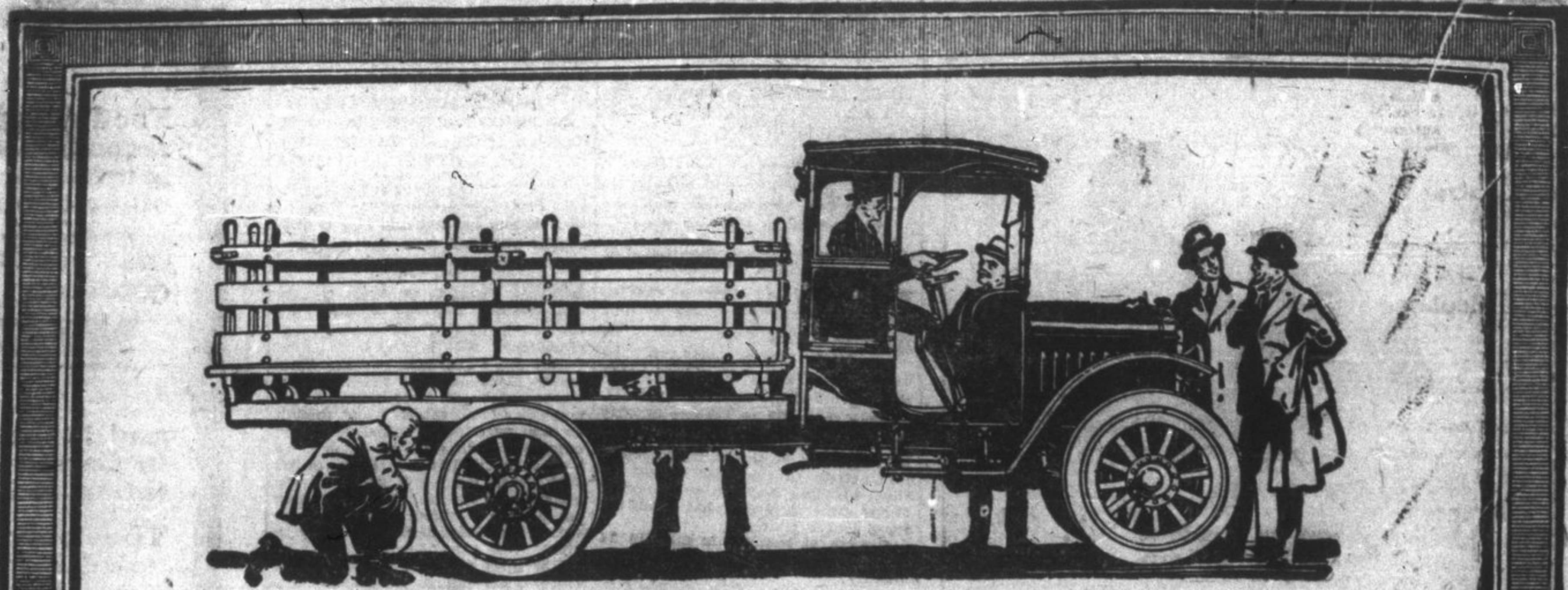
DELTA.
