Day of Abdication One of Mourning, Says Party Leader.

Berne, May 21.—"Our party always has been, and always will be, faithful to the emperor," declared Dr. Kalle, the president of the German People's Party, formerly the National Liberal party, at a meeting of 200 leaders of the party at Jena, according to the Munich Post.

Gustav Strossmann, former leader of the National Liberal party, described Nov. 9th, 1918, as a day of mourning, and said that the monarchical form of government is the proper one for Germany.

Premier Lloyd tendered the resignation of the ministry to Governor of Newfoundland Tuesday night.

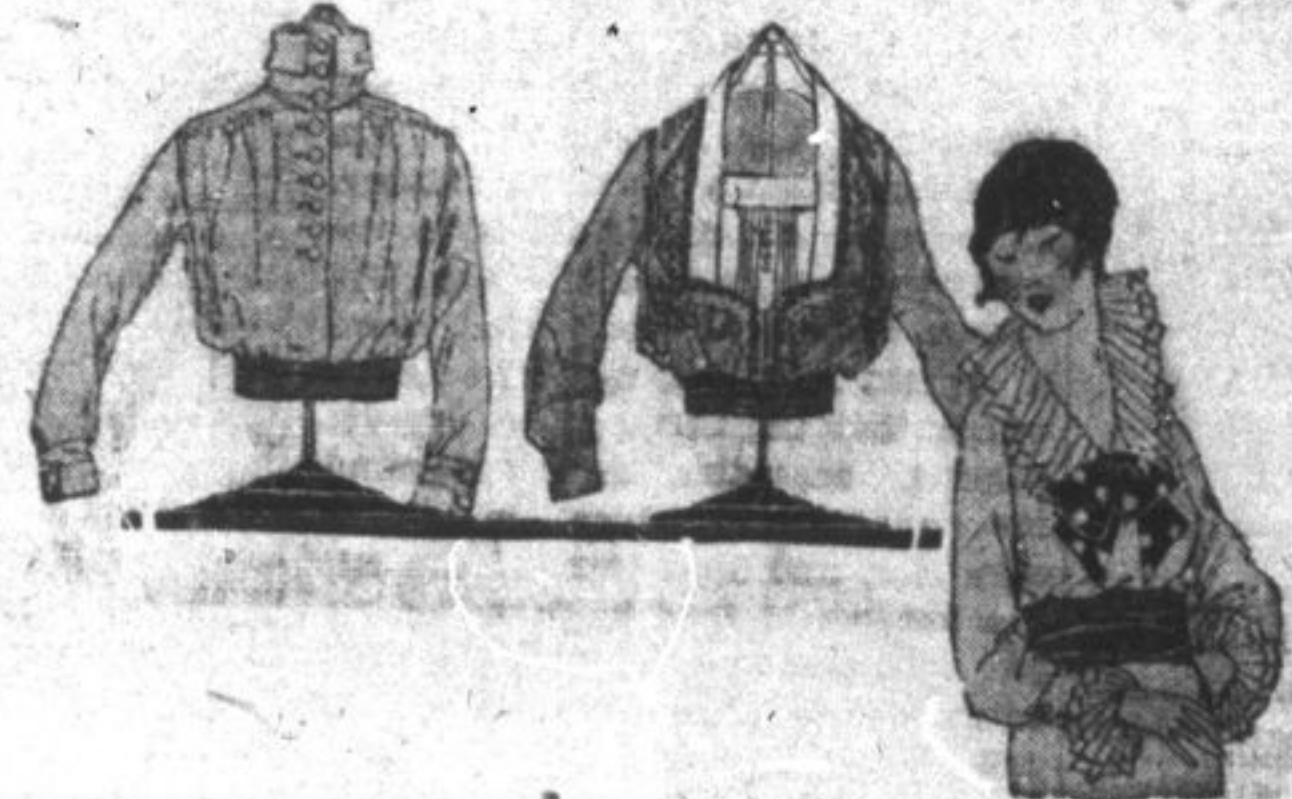
