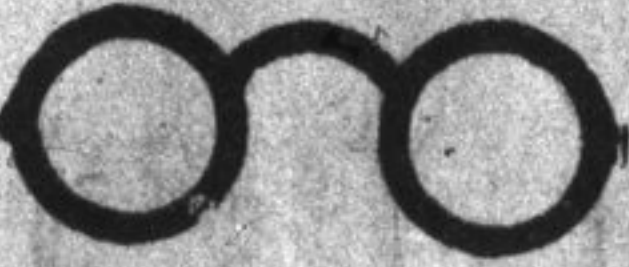

DESIRE TO SELL CHURCH

PERMISSION SOUGHT BY BROCK STREET METHODIST.

Resolution Was Read At Congregational Meeting and Conjectures As To the Future of Methodism in Kingston Are Made—Satisfactory Progress Reported.

In spite of every satisfactory progress, it has been decided by the trustee board of Brock Street Methodist church that permission will be sought at the conference to sell the edifice. At a congregational meeting on Wednesday evening a resolution from the board was read intimating that if conference is agreeable the church will be sold and the congregation will be united with some other church in the city.

Incidentally, there has been considerable discussion on this matter since Queen Street Methodist church was burned and several solutions have been suggested. It has been suggested that Brock street church should be sold, that Queen Street be not rebuilt and that the two congregations unite with Princess Street Methodist church and that a splendid church be erected on Mack street on property now owned by Mrs. B. Carr-Harris who, it is understood, is willing to sell for such purpose. The possibility of church union is also exercising an influence on the situation. However, nothing definite has been done beyond the announcement of the intention to sell Brock street church, and in the meantime it was decided at a meeting of the quarterly board of that church on Wednesday night, after the congregational meeting, that a cordial invitation would be extended to Rev. J. A. Ellis, pastor of Queen Street church, and his congregation to worship with the members of Brock street church.

At the congregational meeting reports were received of the various departments of church activity and gratifying progress in each was announced. The membership is encouraging and aside from a small mortgage the finances of the church are in excellent shape.

Rev. D. A. Lough, who recently came to the city as pastor, has been most successful in his new charge and his efforts received the approbation of all. The following were elected by the congregation as "secretaries": representatives: James Armstrong, A. S. James, T. F. Auld, J. Gerardi, H. Rea, H. W. Healey and J. Crawford.

Returned From Overseas.
Capt. D. L. Kennedy, son of M. J. Kennedy, of Portsmouth, has arrived in Toronto from overseas, and is expected home in the course of a few days. Capt. Kennedy has seen three and a half years' service overseas, and was gassed. He went overseas with the 48th Highlanders.

Halifax is to give a warm welcome to Sir Robert Borden on his arrival.

The prohibition bill to prohibit liquor for the next twelve months passed the Commons Wednesday night.

The Caronis docked at Halifax at 12.30 Thursday morning, with troops on board, including the 21st of Kingston.

Sir Adam Beck asks the Hydro-Electric employees to postpone the strike. The Chippewa power men may go out to-day.

The Skillings, Whitneys & Barnes Lumber Co., Ogdensburg, N.Y., contemplates removing its plant to Brattleboro, Vt.

Sir John Eaton, in Winnipeg from Toronto, threatens to close the Eaton store for a year if the strikers win. The employees are armed.

Austin Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, states in the British House that the cost of the war to Great Britain was thirty-three billion dollars.

H. N. Moore, calling from London to the Montreal Star, says that Sir Robert Borden is in a determination to eliminate Bolshevik tendencies and will demand the exportation of foreign agitators who under an alias deceive the Canadian laboring classes.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Movements of Vessels in and About Kingston Harbor.

The steamer Haddington arrived from Montreal at 11.15 p.m. and cleared for Port Colborne at 11.20 p.m. on Wednesday.

The steamer Belleville arrived from Toronto at 4.45 a.m. and cleared for Toronto at 5.55 a.m. on Thursday.

The steamer Cadillac arrived from Montreal at 12.45 a.m. and cleared for Port Colborne at 1.20 p.m. on Thursday.

The steamer Holcomb is taking on another cargo of corn at Richardson's elevator, for the Cardinal starch works.

The steamer Jeska arrived in port from Smith's Falls, and is at the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company's dock.

The members of the crew of the barge Bacon have arrived in port.

Oleomargarine.

The Order-in-Council permitting the importation, manufacture and sale of oleomargarine expires with the official ending of the war. Legislation will be required, apparently, to continue the permission. No doubt dairy and other agricultural interests will oppose it, because, even recently, association gatherings, they have gone in record against oleomargarine.

But with the price of butter around sixty-five and seventy cents, compared with thirty cents early in the war, and with an insatiable export demand taking away more than our surplus, the continuance of the oleomargarine trade is necessary. The price which oleomargarine has found in our kitchen economy is indicated by the fact that the two Canadian companies making it furnish about 15,000,000 pounds a year, and about 15,000,000 pounds is imported. For every six pounds of butter made in Canada about one pound of oleomargarine is consumed.

The workman, with a family to support in these days of outrageous prices, cannot pay seventy cents for butter. Producers of butter are receiving about sixty cents a pound for it, with an unlimited market. It is safe to say that we would have dollar buttes if the price influence of this 30,000,000 pounds of oleomargarine were gone. Canada's industrial population must have food.

Will Set Aside.
Smith's Falls, May 22.—Judge Scott delivered judgment, setting aside the will of Rebecca Barnum, Smith's Falls. The will was drawn by a layman about ten days before she died. About four years ago she made a previous will in which she bequeathed her estate to her brother, Noah Chant. In the last will now set aside, she cut him out entirely, leaving her estate to the widow of a deceased nephew, David Chant, and her children. The family of David Chant lived with the old lady until her death. After his sister's death, Noah Chant learned of the will and brought action to have it set aside on various grounds and he has succeeded. Noah Chant now gets all the estate.
