BOY'S NARROW ESCAPE

Five-Year-Old Fell Into a Sluiceway. It is only a miracle that a five-year-old boy, son of John Wilson, general merchant of Marlborough, escaped with his life at the present time. The lad, while playing, accidentally opened the gate of the sluiceway and fell head-first into the running water. He was carried down the flume for a distance of about two hundred feet. There the water drove the lad part way through the narrow hole at the end of the flume. Mr. Whitman, a helper, who heard the splash of the water quickly notified Mr. Wilson and they saw the lad's head sticking through the hole. The boy was rescued and was found to be suffering from a number of bad bruises but otherwise none the worse of his experience. At the point where the lad came out the water forms a spray of about fourteen feet.
