TAPPING THE NEW NORTH

Span Over Peace River Is Link of Civilization.

It is seldom that the term "halfway house" may properly be applied to a bridge, but such is the case with the giant Peace River bridge of the Edmonton and Dunvegan Railway, at Peace River, formerly Peace River Crossing, Alberta.

For three hundred miles down stream to the eastward of its spans and for exactly the same distance up towards the Rockies the river is navigable. Thus it links all dwellers near the stream with civilization; for the southern terminus is Edmonton.

"But the line should be extended hundreds of miles northward again, into the heart of the Peace River country," was the statement of no less a Peace River enthusiast than Percy Sholto Douglas, ninth Marquess of Queensberry.

The Alberta and Dunvegan line is the one whose bond interest payments cannot be met by its western builders and whose acquisition by the Dominion is being urged at Ottawa.

It was learned recently that the railway, with all its wonderful future possibilities, is not in good condition. Although new, and indeed built only half-way to its strategic destination, the line is lacking in proper ballast, while the cars are very ramshackle.

Lack of funds is said to be the sole difficulty, as the constructive abilities of Mr. J. D. MacArthur, the head of the company, are not questioned. The Alberta Government, has guaranteed the bonds to the extent of \$20,000 per mile, and is also making representations.

Aside from the financial crisis, the urgency of the case typified by this "in the air" bridge is that the commercial feasibility of oil production in the hinterland depends on northward extension of the steel. Drillers have gone in and are striking oil every time.

Thousands of settlers have also trekked in ahead of the line, and have laid barren in considerable acreage and are producing fine grains.

"It is a bit of paradise," said Lord Queensberry in enthusiastic exclamation, after describing the possibilities of the district. "The town of Peace River itself is thriving and has two weekly newspapers, each equipped with power plant and modern composing machinery. Nearer the mountains there is gold-copper ore in which I have every confidence."

"The nearer to the Mackenzie river one gets, the better are the oil prospects," he added, pointing to a copy of the Peace River Record which reported his activities in sending up exploring parties, drilling rigs, and contending that the usefulness of the wonderful bridge is lost if the line is not completed.

Aerial "Jitney" in Toronto. The first Toronto aviator to make use of his flying experience for financial gain is L. R. H. Holmes, formerly an R.A.F. aviator, who bought a Curtiss 80-horsepower biplane and proposes conducting a series of aero joy-riding business during the summer months. He is advertising his amusement for the benefit of those who have experienced the sensations of aerial flights and wish to be taken up for a fifteen-minute straight flight at an altitude of over 3,000 feet at a fixed charge.

Those who request to be taken to the thrills of looping the loop, the spinning nose dive and the other stunts which make the uninitiated shiver to think of performing, Lieut. Holmes says he will willingly accommodate them only on request. He is out to build up a business this summer and says that he intends taking no chances on applying it by dangerous exploits in the air.

Lieut. Holmes' charge will be in the neighborhood of \$15 for the same number of minutes of straight flying, which means that for that charge the passenger will be in the air about half an hour, as it takes nearly ten minutes to ascend and to make a landing. Lieut. Holmes thinks the amusement will be very popular in the summer months, and he is laying plans for an extensive business.

The progressive young aviator is a fully-qualified aviator, being the possessor of a regular aviator's license and pilot's certificate. He was engaged as an instructor at Leaside and Camp Borden for a year prior to last fall, when the training of the R.A.F. was at its unusual record of never having had a crash or an accident of any kind during his period as an aviator. His trips with passengers are to be taken from Armour Heights, where his plane is housed in its hangar ready for use.

Sow Fasted Three Months. That a pig can retain life for three months without nourishment has been demonstrated to Uriah Pendleton of Milmer. Last December Mr. Pendleton was puzzled over the mysterious disappearance of a sow. He had ceased to think of his loss when a couple of weeks ago the sow reappeared in the barnyard. She weighed 450 when she vanished, but came back a skeleton, every bone being discernible. The sow had forced her way into a small passage between the remains of a stack which had been cut down sheer and the new stack built over it, and was unable to get out. There she remained for three months and six days without anything to eat or drink other than what nourishment could be obtained from the straw within reach. The animal is picking up and has already put on considerable flesh.

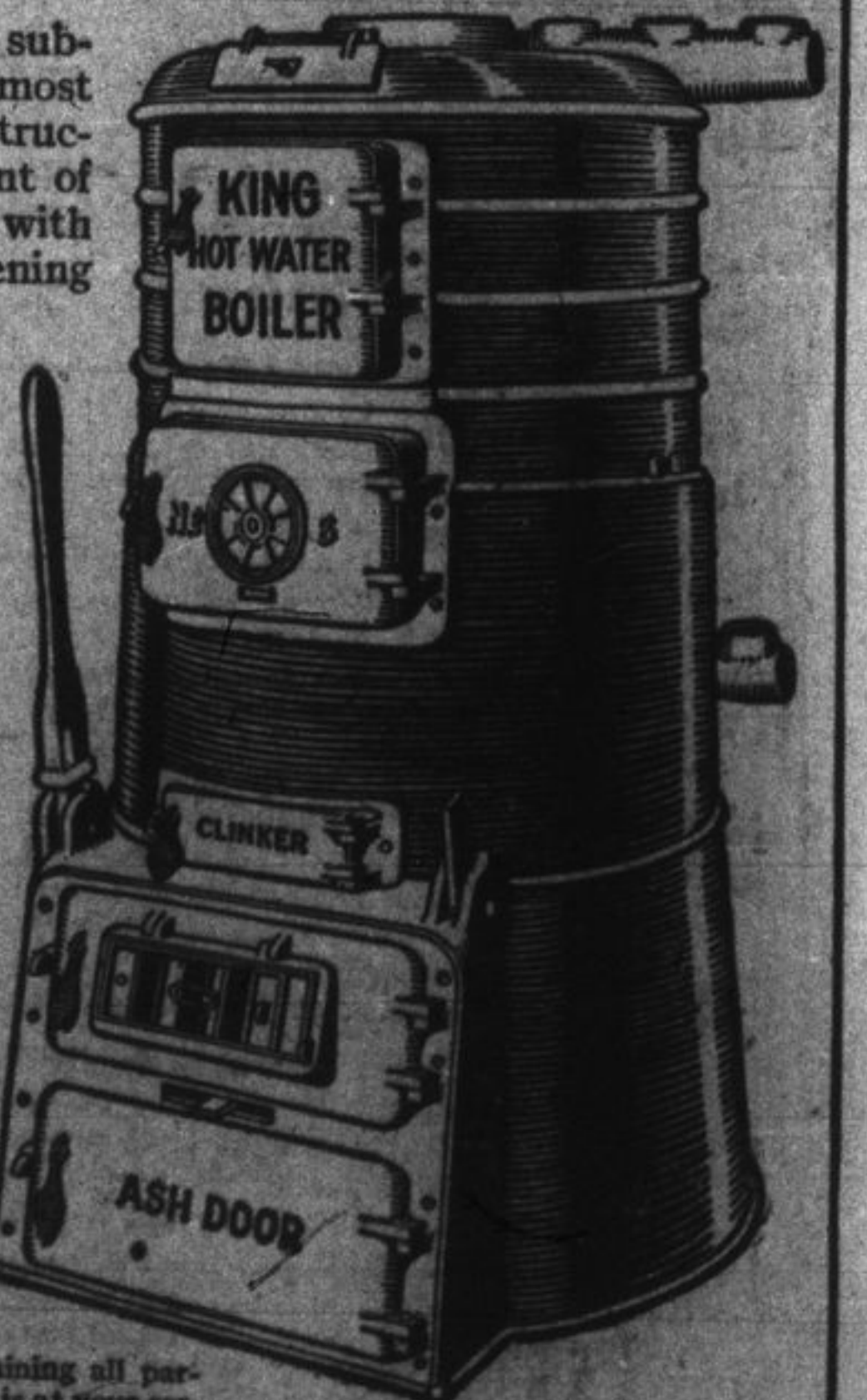

THE BURDEN OF A \$500-A-YEAR SALARY

It is perfectly obvious, therefore, that so to increase salaries in this province, as to make teaching an attractive and honorable vocation by making it remunerative and desirable, something more practicable than either the sections or moral suasion is requisite. There must be radical reform of our system in at least two ways. First, the number of sections must be reduced, and those remaining made much larger. Second, the method of support must be completely reformed. It seems to us that the sections should be responsible only for buildings, their equipment and maintenance, and that the cost of salaries should be assumed either by the province or the county municipality or by the two conjointly.—Halifax Herald.
