WHO STANDS FOR CANADA?

THIS QUESTION IS ASKED BY "THE VETERAN."

Asks Its Comrades All Over Canada To Sink Personal Grievances in This Period of National Danger.

By midsummer Canada may be plunged into the throes of a revolution. The perilous forces are at work with the avowed intention of overthrowing constitutional authority and replacing it with Soviet rule. Plans are being elaborated which seek to sweep aside established law and order, and carry the "Red" flag triumphantly from Vancouver to Halifax by "any means which justify the end." Tirelessly the propagandists of Bolshevism are working, in season and out, here, there and everywhere. Despite the surface calm and outward signs of peace and quietude which prevail, disturbed only by the faintest rumblings of unemployed discontent in the present crisis, Canada is at this moment in imminent danger of the flames of anarchy which have so rapidly spread in Europe during the past six months. Embors from the intermittent fires of rampant socialism are being zealously fanned to white-hot heat by revolutionary "labor leaders" in Vancouver and elsewhere, in the hope that sparks may ultimately set ablaze a Dominion-wide prairie fire which will blot out existing landmarks of social, economic and industrial order. The propaganda committee appointed at the recent labor convention in Calgary is, and has been, assiduously carrying out its purpose by every means humanly possible. The Cabinet is fully alive to the situation. Were the public to be made acquainted with the full significance and gravity of the situation, the Veteran is convinced that a wave of alarm, and even panic, would seize this country which might well precipitate calamity. These statements are made with a full sense of responsibility, and with knowledge of actual facts. It is our intention to combat to the uttermost limit this element of anarchy, which seeks to destroy the national life of Canada, and set up in place thereof the unspeakable iniquity and chaos of blind revolution, led and controlled by fanatics who seek an autocratic power more devilish and inhuman than the lust of the Hun.

Thinking men and women will realize that it is impossible for us to print in these columns the complete information upon which this appeal is based—for it is an appeal of the most earnest and serious nature, an appeal to the loyalty and co-operation of all classes of the community to prevent the cataclysm which threatens. Being the fountain-head of opportunity for the collection of reliable information from all parts of Canada, the Veteran deems it a duty and obligation to give warning of the impending crash and strain every effort to stay the evil that is threatening so closely. In doing so we wish it to be clearly understood that we serve no party, no "interests," and no combination, but we do wish to serve Canada. We offer no apology for the Government, which, it must be admitted, has been largely responsible for the present danger, but we do wish to see it in a position to be able to carry out its policy of blind optimism and "laissez-faire," neither do we condone or mitigate in any way the damnable corruption and jobbery which has so long been enshrined by the "robbering" in each financial and political circle. These things have been allowed to develop and continue until the pendulum has reached its furthest extremity, and now commences to swing back with gathering momentum. Recriminations and excuses for the present crisis, Promises and pledges for the future are not acceptable. The time has come for action—direct and prompt.

There is but one recourse for the Government, and that is to "deal the thunder" of the past by the force of opposition. There is no middle way. There is no time for temporizing; no place for timid pacifists or stubborn reactionaries. We are facing a crisis in the history of the nation. On the one hand we have a Government which, from lack of leadership and courage, has lost the confidence of the people, who are sick to death of the "steals," the deceptions, the hypocrites, the insincerities, and the camouflage which is summed up in one word, "politics." On the other side there is the rising tide of determined desire for a living democracy, loosened and awakened by the tragedy of war and suffering. The masses won the war and the classes profited thereby. The fight is now on for an ultimate control of the Government, and the establishment of a so-called "proletariat," but which are of fundamental benefit to all. Sympathy born of suffering is leading many good men into the insurrectionist camp. Insidious propaganda proves to them that, after all, there is no tendency towards true democracy on the part of our "leaders and teachers," and that there cannot be so long as they remain bound by the pre-war ideals of capitalism, and that the only way to bring about the desired change is by fire and annihilation. Make no mistake about it, the disciples of anarchism are working overtime in Canada, and the harvest they seek is either looked longingly and alluringly, if they fail in the attempt, the aliens will be blamed. If they succeed—but they will not. The one link in the infernal chain they are forging which presents the greatest uncertainty is the attitude of returned men. Every effort is being centred on winning them over to the "cause." Unemployment presents the opening. Invidious comparisons are drawn between the fighter and the profiteer; the reasons of unemployment are subtly suggested, and vengeance and equalization are shown to be only possible through the path of rebellion and revolution. Vital issues hinge upon the problem of unemployment.

We have spoken of the danger and the remedy; now we turn to the appeal which constitutes the reason for this article, and which is made to all who claim citizenship and the ideals of Canadianism. Particularly do we address ourselves to the men who served Canada on the battlefields of Europe. It was they who nailed the flag of true Canadianism to the mast, and in the coming struggle for all that is most dear and noble, it is to them that Canada will look for leadership and protection. Should not the war veterans be in the forefront of those who demand constitutional rearrangement of the social order? Can we, who have written our record of loyalty in letters of blood, stand idly by while the sedition-mongers, the aliens, the anarchists and the renegades, among our own countrymen dictate how the principles of the

democracy for which we fought shall be brought into being in our country? Shall we allow our family quarrels to be butted into by the traitors who tried to shoot us in the back while we stayed the Hun over it? Is this our country, or is it theirs? Did they fight for it, or did they help us one iota while we were over there? Are we going to be dictated to by men who claimed allegiance to no country while we were at war, but who now presume

to determine how this Dominion shall be governed?

As veterans we have our grievances, many of them due to lack of understanding on the part of those on authority. We have borne with very creditable patience many irritating delays, and a long list of exasperating scandals. We have our share of private and public feuds and a full measure of repatriation difficulties, but—our first duty, as veterans with a proud record of service behind us, is to Canada and her interests. In face of the greater danger now threatening we ask our comrades from Vancouver to Halifax to stand shoulder to shoulder, forming a "but-tress against the invasion and devastation now planned by the followers of Lenin and Trotsky, sinking petty feuds, laying aside for the time being all personal grievances, and thereby proving to the people of Canada that the Great War Veterans' Association is a solid unit in support of British ideals and constitutional aims. According to the manner in which we acquit ourselves at this juncture shall we be judged in the future. We appeal also for a full measure of support from every loyal citizen to aid in stamping out the menace now creeping stealthily into the sanctity of our homeland. When Canada is rid of the foul brood who preach and teach anarchy, we shall have something to say to the profiteers who encourage revolution.

Meanwhile, without undue pessimism, and without scare-mongering, the Veterans commend to the immediate attention of Parliament the situation as it exists; the recommendations herewith offered in sincerity and faith, and call upon all who deem themselves true citizens to plainly prove "Who stands for Canada?"
