The list of the owners of motor cars who are willing to give the convalescent soldiers in our hospitals pleasure trips, is being made up by Captain, the Rev. J. McNabb, chaplain at Queen's military hospital. A number of sympathetic and generous citizens are unreluctant in their efforts to give a little pleasure to the men who, by reason of their wounds and crippled condition received in battle with the Germans, are forced to spend long, weary days, weeks and months cooped up within the hospital walls tormented by thoughts of their helplessness which they see constantly mirrored in the faces of their companions. Some of these men have had to undergo repeated operations in the hope of restoring a hand, an arm or a leg to partial usefulness. The doctors and nurses are unrelenting in their efforts on behalf of these men, but the citizens who have a car idle for an hour or two during our fine bright days can bring a bright spot in the monotony of enforced confinement and hasten the process of healing. And the patients are entitled to it. It is impossible to place their claims too strongly before persons in a position to respond.

Representations have been made to the president and secretary of the Automobile Club and these officials have expressed themselves as being glad to do all in their power to give the convalescents the proposed pleasure trips. It is only necessary to telephone Captain McNabb to add your name to his list, but it would be well to state what hour in the day would be most convenient.
