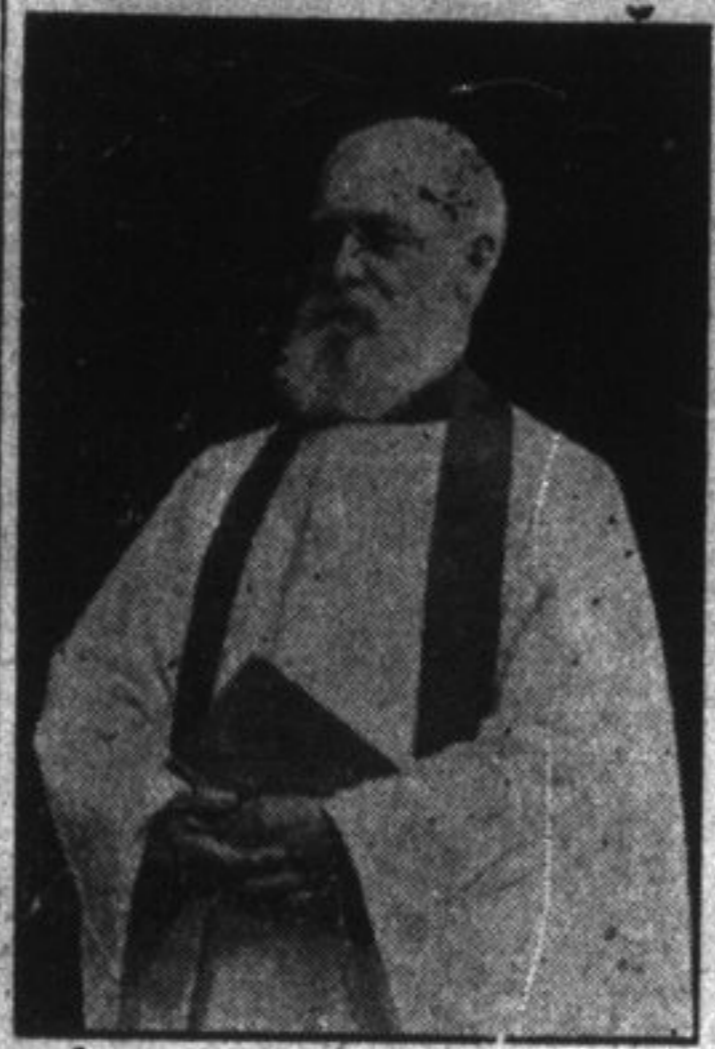

SIXTY-ONE YEARS' SERVICE WOLFE ISLAND MEETING

IS THE PROUD RECORD OF CANON E. LOUCKS OF KINGSTON.

He Was For Over Twenty-nine Years Rector at Picton—Was Ordained in the Cathedral at Quebec.

A service of sixty-one years in the ministry. Such is the proud record of Canon E. Loucks, one of Kingston's best-known citizens, and he is receiving the congratulations of a

wide circle of friends, for it is a record that he has every reason to be proud of. For some few weeks Canon Loucks has been on the sick list, but is now improving, and it is the wish of his friends that he will soon be restored to good health. He is now in his ninetieth year, and during the sixty-one years engaged in the ministry, he has been an active worker in the Anglican church. Although advanced in years, he has been a regular attendant at meetings of synod, taking an active part in the deliberations. Canon Loucks made many friends, and is widely known. Ill-health compelled him to give up a charge he had at Picton in 1903, but since that time he took charge of eight different parishes. TO HEAR A. M. RANKIN M.P.P. ON ROAD QUESTION.

The Islanders Ask Their Municipal Council to Take Steps to Place Wolfe Island Under Provincial Road Scheme.

A good roads meeting was held in the C.M.B.A. hall, Wolfe Island, on Thursday evening, with Rev. Father Fleming presiding. There was a large attendance of the rate-payers to hear the proposals outlined by Anthony Rankin, M.P.P. in the prosecution of the government's programme of good road building throughout the rural districts. The local member suggested that, in view of the desirability of good roads on the island, the township council should discuss road betterment and if favorable, to refer their plan to the county council for ratification. The matter could then be referred to the rate-payers for vote after the estimated cost had been prepared. Mr. Rankin said that the system of road building heretofore followed was only a waste of money for in the end the roads were in worse condition than before, and he had Prof. Scott of Queen's University give an illustrated lecture to show how roads should, and should not be built. The lantern views were most interesting and instructive and showed that while it was vitally important to use good material, it was equally important that the method of construction should be correct from an engineering standpoint. In this consisted the whole secret of good roads. Under the government's policy it is hoped to change the conditions on Wolfe Island, where the roads are in a deplorable state after each rain fall.
