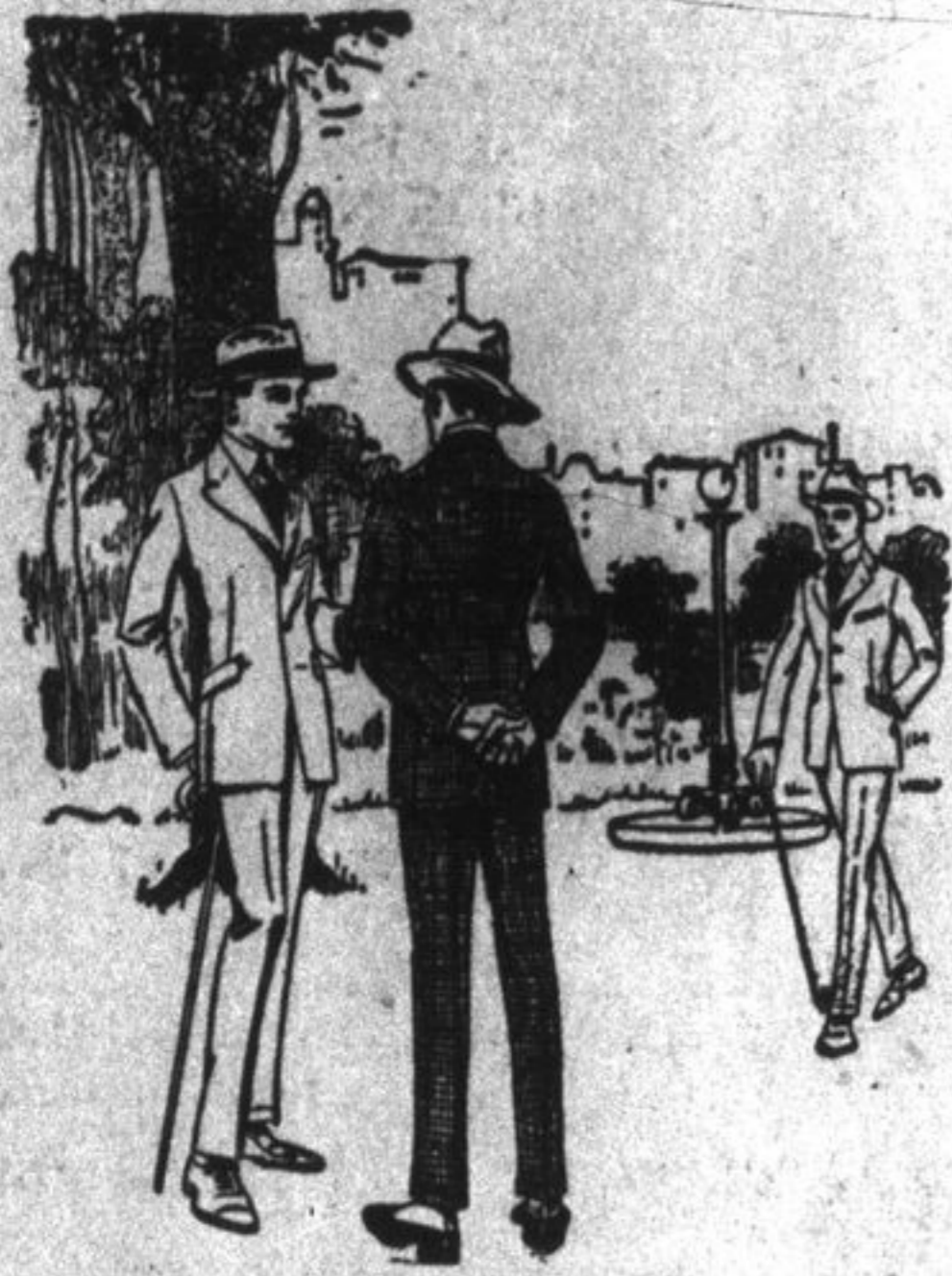

THE WORLD'S NEWS IN CONDENSED FORM

Tidings From All Over Told in a Pointed and Pithy Way.

The Balkan States have asked the allied powers for further time to consider the peace terms offered.

Charles Brew, Lindsay, was sentenced to penitentiary for five years for theft. He was a bad actor.

Toronto has been chosen as the place for the next annual convention of the Big Brotherhood Movement.

Commander J. K. L. Ross will retire the famous stake horse, Sir E. Barton, at the end of the present season.

The Sault Ste. Marie branch of the G.W.V.A. unanimously voted to oppose the Calgary resolution asking for a gratuity from \$2,000 down.

The first memorial day after the close of the great world conflict was observed throughout the United States Friday as a general holiday.

A compilation of yields on twenty-representative stocks listed in New York shows that the high prices have brought the average yield down to 5.53 per cent.

An impending new rebellion in Ireland, with hints of some imminent drastic action by the Government, has been the subject of prominent paragraphs and articles in certain of the London newspapers during the past few days.

NOTHING HAS BEEN DONE Towards Effecting a Settlement of the Strike Here.

In view of the proposal contained in the letter of ex-Mayor F. J. Hoag, a representative of the British Whig interviewed the president of the metal trades to ascertain whether any steps had been taken to bring about a settlement of the strike, but it was found that nothing had been done. F. G. Wallace, president of the Canadian Locomotive Company, when interviewed stated that there was no change in the situation and he had no announcement to make. From other inquiries in connection with the strike it is apparent that the Federation of Metal Workers, which superseded the local unions, is responsible for the situation. It secured the acquiescence of the local unions to its programme by promise of an eight-hour day and an improved schedule of wages, and it was in obedience to a general order that the employees of the Locomotive Works walked out, and not through any dispute. They await the executive of the federation to make good its promises.

Military News

A Halifax despatch says: The Canadian troops returned on Thursday from overseas service aboard the Carmania were invited to volunteer for duty in preserving order, if the need arises, in cities affected by the widespread strike. Most of the men, it was stated, expressed willingness to serve if required to do so.

Brig-Gen. V. A. S. Williams, G. O. C., inspected the stockades and ordnance stores at Barrfield on Friday morning.

The troops from the SS. Carmania, including the R.C.H.A., numbering 18 officers and 272 men, are on the way to Kingston. They are expected to arrive by G.T.R. at Tete de Pont barracks on Saturday afternoon. The Armouries has been redecorated with flags and bunting and the tables are being set for the banquet that will take place after the arrival of the troops.

The 38th Ottawa Battalion, which has Kingston and district men, is to sail from England on the Olympic, likely Saturday.

Major Clyde R. Scott, district record officer, has been appointed inspector of records for Eastern Canada, in addition to his other duties.

Brig-Gen. Williams inspected the machine gun section of the C.G.R. detachment at Fort Henry, on Friday morning, and in the afternoon he inspected the cadets at the Collegiate Institute.

The SS. Empress of Russia arrived at Victoria, B.C., with 123 troops from Siberia for the Kingston district. The men will be kept in quarantine two weeks owing to smallpox and scarlet fever aboard ship.

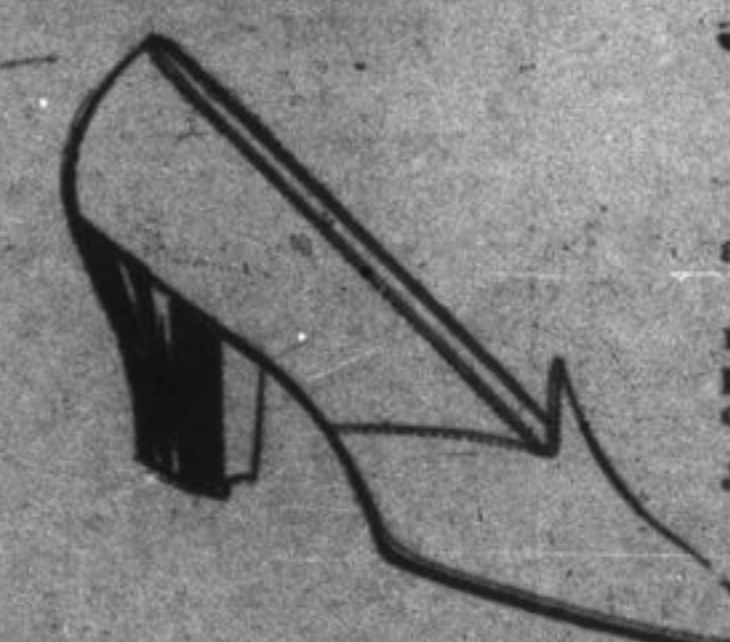
