PRESBYTERIAL W.M. SOCIETY ROUNDED UP AT ODESSA

ANNUAL MEETING HELD IN DESERONTO THIS WEEK.

The Reports Presented and Addresses Delivered — There Were Kingston Delegates in Attendance.

The fifth annual meeting of the Kingston Presbyterian Women's Missionary Society was held in the Church of the Redeemer, Deseronto, on Wednesday and Thursday, with seventy-six visiting delegates registered in attendance as well as the Deseronto members. Wednesday evening was devoted to the president's address and reports of committees, after a very cordial address of welcome from Miss Dunwoodie, of Deseronto, and a reply by Mrs. George Westwood, Belleville, and greetings from the Anglican and Methodist sister societies.

Mrs. Wall, the president, gave a most inspiring address dealing with the problems that are to be met with both at home and abroad with "after the war" conditions.

Thursday morning was taken up with routine business, and some interesting discussions of best methods of work.

On Thursday afternoon the speakers were Mrs. J. R. Duff, of Kingston, who gave a very comprehensive report of the provincial meeting in Guelph, and Mrs. Gollen, of the Brockville Presbyterian, who gave a beautiful and inspirational address in connection with the "Forward Movement."

At the evening meeting the Rev. T. B. McCorkindale presided, the Rev. A. J. Wilson, of Napanee, brought the greetings of the Kingston Presbytery.

Miss Mowat, of Kingston, read an interesting account of the first meeting of the Kingston Presbyterian W. M. S. held in March, 1886. The paper was prepared by Mrs. Barron, of Gananoque, who died a short time ago.

The principal speaker was Mrs. McDonald, of the Presbyterian Mission in Korea, who gave a most interesting account of the country and conditions there. Like other countries, Korea is suffering from the high cost of living. As an instance Miss McDonald said that a load of wood that before the war cost \$1 now costs \$12. Four Mission Band girls were dressed in Korean costume representing Mr. and Mrs. Kim and their two children. The grown-ups were quite as keen over the "dressing up" as were the young people.

The membership this year is \$22, and Mission Band membership 248. The total giving was \$4,027.25. Two items of interest from foreign mission work were (1) That Mr. Wong, the principal delegate from China to the Peace Conference is a Christian and graduate of our mission schools in Shanghai. (2) That the native Chinese press not only accepts articles from Dr. Donald McGilvray, our missionary in charge of all the Christian publications work in China, but urges him to write articles and editorials for them, for which they gladly pay, thus giving an opening for Christian teaching through the columns of the heathen press and also adding to the missionary funds.

The ladies of Deseronto were most hospitable. The delegates were met and conveyed in motors first to the church and then to their hostesses' homes, and a very delicious and sumptuous tea was provided in the school room each evening. The choir and several lady soloists also deserved our hearty thanks for the music they provided, and an altogether delightful meeting was brought to a close in time to catch the 10 p.m. train home.

Letters to the Editor

Discussing Rev. Ben. Spence's Case, Odessa, May 14.—(To the Editor): Your further discussion of the Rev. Ben. Spence's case will not change my opinion of any one who knows the facts of the case. The Spence edition of the book was not wanted at the time it was printed. There was no attempt to distribute the book, and Mr. Spence gave the censor his pledge that it would not be distributed until the censor had given his decision, and that the decision, whatever it was would be loyally observed. That does not look like defying the censor. Then, when the first action was taken, he was to have the privilege of being tried by a jury. That case was delayed from time to time and at last was finally disposed of by being withdrawn by the crown after the war was all over. Mr. Spence was given to understand that there would be no further prosecution, and so his counsel waived the formality of having a jury, impanelled and a verdict of "not guilty" brought in. In the second prosecution the crown persistently denied him the right of being judged by his peers. It may be that Mr. Spence was over-zealous in a good cause. It may be that he was a little rash in having a book printed that was somewhat similar to one that had been banned, but that does not excuse the tyrannical way in which his case was handled. By all means let the guilty be punished, but we decidedly object to a worthy and an innocent man who intended no wrongdoing being branded as a criminal; and a man moreover who is just as loyal and patriotic as the censor himself. My motive, would you be surprised to learn that many people are firmly of the opinion that the work of Mr. Spence in behalf of winning the war was more effective than that of the censor?

Your claim that the banning of the book was the proper thing to do, Mr. Spence and the Globe think differently. I would very much like to see the book to judge for myself as to who is right and who is wrong. I submit that it is an unmerited reflection on the intelligence of Canadians that we should be the only people on the face of the earth who are forbidden to read that book.
