### TWELVE ROUND TOO FEW

For Willard-Dempsey Fight Says An English Expert.

Among the boxing leaders of England the Willard-Dempsey fight, because of the twelve-round limit, is not regarded with respect. They can not see how the heavyweight championship of the world can be decided in only thirty-six minutes. Among those who deprecate the meeting is Eugene Corrie, who calls the bout a pantomime.
