THE COUNTY COURT DOCKET

CASES TO BE HEARD BY JUDGE MADDEN NEXT WEEK.

Non-Jury and Jury Civil Cases Are Listed—Four Criminal Cases Including That of Convict Rogers.

The docket of civil cases entered for the county court sittings on Tuesday, June 10th, with Judge Madden presiding, comprises the following:

B. E. Newton v Andrew Matson and James Matson for \$500 damages for trespass.

Alexander Redmond v International Harvester Co., of Canada Ltd., for \$219 for an ensilage cutter purchased from the defendants which plaintiff claims proved useless.

The above are jury cases. The non-jury cases are:

J. C. Swain v George Swain for \$812 rent of farm and price of chattels not returned.

E. W. Mullin et ux v Carrie Martin for an injunction restraining defendant from obstructing right of way and for discharging water on plaintiff's lands and for damages for so doing.

I. Cohen & Co., v Baker and Betcheman for \$400 damages for failure to carry out an agreement for sale of fuse turnings.

D. Spelman v J. Diamond for damages for failure to carry out an agreement for the sale and purchase of five tons of honest mixed rags and for the recovery of \$189.35 paid thereon.

D. Garfinkle v Grand Trunk Railway Co. for \$250 for damages sustained by reason of the negligence of the defendants and the delay in carrying goods from Kingston to Toronto.

Rex v Edward McLaughlin for receiving stolen goods.
Rex v Convict Rogers for escape and assaulting guard.

BUILDING PERMITS ISSUED.

May Shows Decrease Over Corresponding Month Last Year.

Permits for buildings and alterations for the month of May, 1919, amounted to \$40,330, a decrease of \$10,390 over the same month last year. The total for the year to May 1919 is \$267,089, an increase of \$185,615 over the same period last year.

B. Jeffrey for frame dwelling on Macdonnell street between Durham and Johnson streets; H. A. Desjardins for brick veneer dwelling on Collingwood street between Union and King streets; McKelvey and Birch, Ltd., for alterations to building at Sydenham Hospital, King street west, for the Dominion government; William Cadl for frame dwelling on Victoria street between Princess street and Concession road; William C. Balbock for frame dwelling on Patrick street, between John street and Markland road; J. Ganymon for frame dwelling on Macdonnell street between Durham and Park streets.

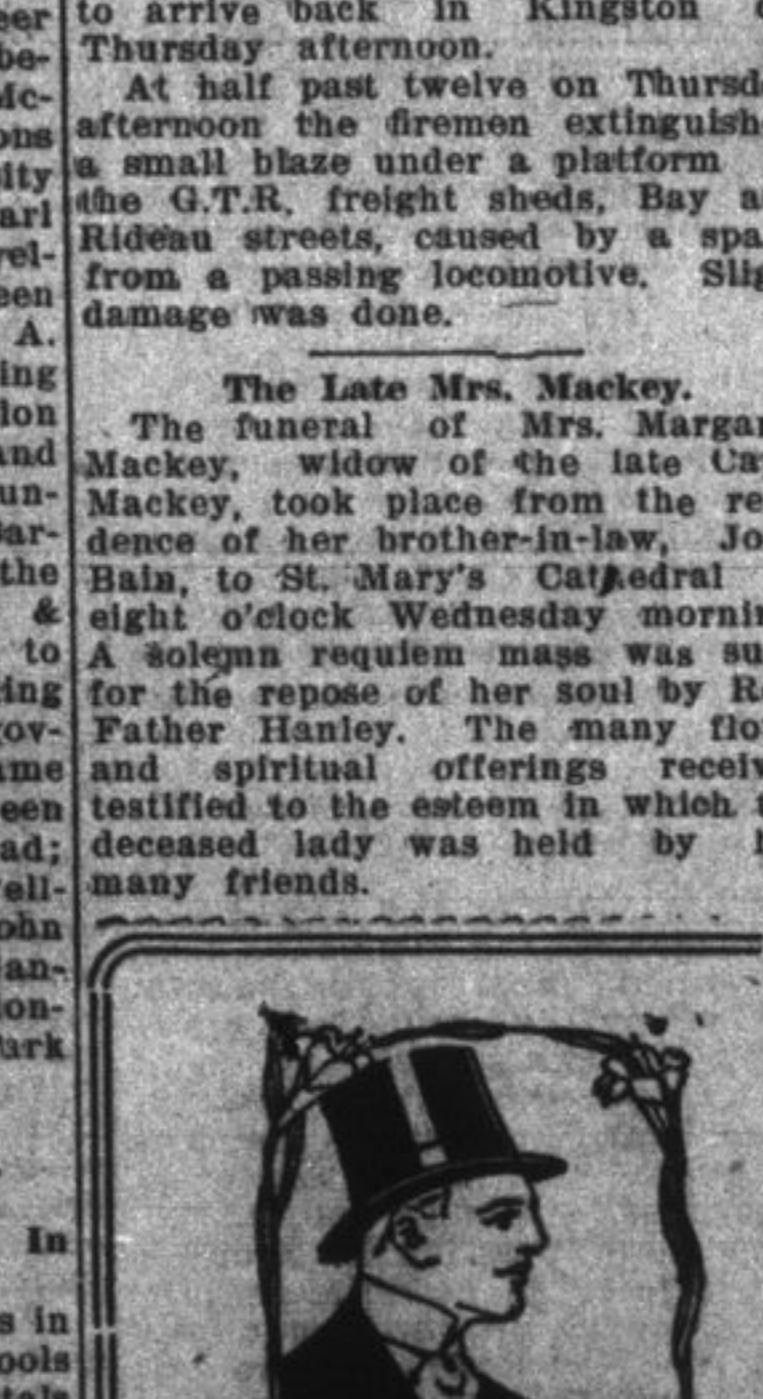
